On what he is excited about in his new role

“First of all, in coaching, you have about 90-hour weeks, but I get to just pick and choose the groups that you get to work with, especially the defensive line and the linebackers. You really can hone in on the technique and not really have to worry about the scheme, but just instilling the championship mentality in the guys.”

On enjoying teaching even when he was playing

“Yeah, I’ve been doing it my whole career. Being a captain on this team for three years, and now being able to come back and do the same thing—and have a lot more time to do it and not have to go out there and perform now—you get to see the other guys do it. Now, it’s a great opportunity to be a part of this organization and help out where I can.”

On if the desire to continue to play is out of his system

“Oh, it’s out. It’s way out of my system (laughs). I’m a dad now and being able to spend some time with my kids—but now I get a couple days here and there where I can come to the games and help the guys out. [I can] come to practice and maybe train a little bit of training camp and throughout the season to really just help the guys out with a lot of technique work and see what they do.”

On if he could play 10 snaps per game if needed

“I could actually give them 25, but we’re not going to talk about that (laughs). Those days are done. Now, I can still put the cleats on and help the guys out in other ways.”

On if his decision to come back and coach with Denver had to do with OLB Von Miller and his old teammates

“It didn’t have anything to do with that. It was just a great opportunity for me to come up here and help out the Denver Broncos. I wish I could help out both teams (Dallas Cowboys), but with the league, you can’t do that. You’ve just got to choose your battles and this right here was my choice.”

On his impressions of OLB Bradley Chubb

“He’s a phenomenal athlete. He’s one of those players that comes in, they don’t know the scheme yet, but they have all the athleticism and the measurables to be a great player. He’s going to be a great attribute for the Denver Broncos.”

On Chubb’s greatest challenge in moving from college to the pros

“The talent that he’s going against. You’ve got guys now that are 35, 36 years old and have been playing in the league for 12 years. Just the maturity. He has to just go out there, learn the scheme and just play lights out. That’s how he played in college, and that’s going to be the hardest part for him. Now, it’s not going to be 12 games that you have in college, it’s going to be probably 20 and it starts with the preseason.”

On how he'd describe his style of coaching

"I just have a light switch. Either you're on or you're off. If you're not on the field, you know what, the light switch is off. When you're on the field, you need to go 100 percent. That's my mentality when I'm out here coaching guys in technique work. When I'm out there really just coaching guys and showing them things, I want your eyes on me because you have my attention. That's how the guys have really been taking on that concept."

On what changes he's seen in Miller since they were teammates

"He's become a lot bigger of a leader on the team. He's leading a lot of the young guys and he's a lot more vocal. Usually, Von is Von, where he's dancing on the sideline and having a good time—and he still will do that—but you can see him now pulling guys to the side, helping them out and really instilling that championship mentality. I really like seeing him do that."
