BRONCOS BEAT TITANS KEEPING PLAYOFF HOPES ALIVE; HOST COLTS IN REGULAR-SEASON FINALE

Behind a potent offensive attack and a fierce defensive effort, Denver pounded Tennessee 37-16 at the Coliseum on Christmas day. Quarterback Jake Plummer completed 21 of 26 passes (80.7%) for 303 yards and two touchdowns, while running back Reuben Droughns scored three touchdowns, earning the Broncos their ninth win of the season. Denver out-gained Tennessee 496 yards to 153, including 193 on the ground and 303 through the air, while holding the Titans to 59 and 94 yards respectively. The Broncos' defense stepped up, limiting Titans quarterback Billy Volek to just 111 yards passing on eight of 20 attempts, and picking him off twice (Kelly Herndon and D.J. Williams). Droughns led the Broncos on the ground, gaining 91 yards on 22 carries (4.1) and two touchdowns, and added a third on a 23-yard reception from Plummer.

In the regular-season finale, Denver hosts Indianapolis in a game that has huge playoff implications for the Broncos. Kickoff is scheduled for 2:15 p.m. (MST) at INVESCO Field at Mile High. With a win, Denver can earn one of two AFC Wild Card Playoff spots. Because both Baltimore and Jacksonville lost Sunday, with a win, Denver will improve to 10-6. If they finish in a tie with Buffalo (9-6 after a win Sunday), the Broncos hold the tiebreaker over the Bills, having a better conference record. The New York Jets are currently 10-5, and with a win Sunday at St. Louis, will clinch the other Wild Card. A complete playoff scenario breakdown can be found on [page 3](#).

RADIO/TELEVISION vs. INDIANAPOLIS

The Broncos and Colts game will be broadcast nationally on CBS-TV and locally on KCNC-TV (Channel 4). **Jim Nantz** will provide the play-by-play, and joining him in the booth will be **Phil Simms** doing the color commentary. **Bonnie Bernstein** will be on the sidelines.

For the 35th consecutive year, KOA radio (850) is the flagship station for the Denver Broncos radio network, and every game this season will be broadcast. **Dave Logan** and **Scott Hastings** will provide the play-by-play and color commentary respectively, with **Alan Roach** on the sidelines. The Broncos radio network extends to nine states, and the KOA pregame show, hosted by **Mike Rice**, begins two hours prior to kickoff.

The game will also be broadcast in Spanish on KBNO radio (1280). **Milo Sanchez** will do the play-by-play, with **Luke Sandoval** adding color commentary.

Westwood One/CBS Radio will provide a national radio broadcast. The team includes **Bob Fitzgerald** and **Jack Ham**.

THE SERIES vs. INDIANAPOLIS

Denver and Indianapolis have faced off 14 times in the regular season since the first meeting in 1974. The Broncos hold a 10-4 (.714) edge, and have only lost once at home, 5-1 (.833). Denver is 5-3 (.625) on the road against the Colts. Denver won at Indianapolis 31-17 in Week 16 last year, but lost 41-10 in the AFC Wild Card Playoff game. This will be the fourth meeting between the teams under the Head Coach Mike Shanahan era, with the Colts holding a 2-1 advantage.

BRONCOS PLAYOFF PICTURE

Denver's playoff future can be summed up in four words: **Win and be in.** Following a win at Tennessee and losses by the Jacksonville Jaguars and Baltimore Ravens, allow the Broncos passage into the postseason with nothing more than a win over Indianapolis Sunday.

The Colts enter that game with their January plans set; they are locked into the No. 3 seed of the AFC playoffs. They cannot move up into a first-round bye slot at No. 2 because the second-seeded New England Patriots hold a head-to-head tiebreaker by virtue of a Week 1 win in Foxboro, Mass. The Colts can't move down to No. 4 because they hold a head-to-head tiebreaker over the San Diego Chargers, whom they beat 34-31 on Sunday.

A win over the Colts gives the Broncos the No. 5 or No. 6 seed. The only way the Broncos can gain the No. 5 seed is with a win, a New York Jets loss at St. Louis and a Bills win over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Under that scenario, the Bills, Broncos and Jets would be tied at 10-6. But in a wild-card tiebreaker, the first deadlock snapped is between two division teams, so the Jets and Bills would go against each other.

Step 1: Bills and Jets split head-to-head.

Step 2: Bills and Jets tied in division record at 3-3.

Step 3: Bills would be 9-3 against common opponents; Jets would be 7-5.

That eliminates the Jets. The Broncos and Bills would both qualify for the playoffs, and would then advance to a tiebreaker for the No. 5 seed. Denver would win that tiebreaker because of a 7-5 conference record; Buffalo would be 6-6.

The conference-record tiebreaker also explains why the Broncos would defeat the Bills in a two-way deadlock at 10-6—a possibility if the Bills, Broncos and Jets all win, giving the Jets sole possession of the No. 5 seed with an 11-5 mark.

If the Broncos win and the Bills lose, the Jets' result would be irrelevant. Denver would be the No. 6 seed whether the Jets win or lose, because if Denver and New York are in a two-way tie at 10-6, Denver loses a common-opponent tiebreaker.

Should Denver lose Sunday, the Broncos could still qualify for the playoffs, but would need help, in the following forms:

... a Bills loss at home to Pittsburgh;

... a Jaguars loss or tie at Oakland;

... a Ravens loss or tie at home to Miami.

This would create a two-way tie between Buffalo and Denver for the sixth seed at 9-7. Denver would win because of a better record against AFC opponents (6-6 to 5-7).

Under every other scenario, the Broncos would lose out in the tiebreaker. A three-way tiebreaker against Buffalo and Baltimore would go against Denver on a strength of victory measurement (collective winning percentage of the teams a club defeats). A three-way deadlock against Buffalo and Jacksonville would go to the Jaguars because of a sweep over the Bills and Broncos. A four-way deadlock with the Bills, Jaguars and Ravens would also go against the Broncos on strength of victory.

**THE LAST TIME (REGULAR SEASON)
DENVER 31, at INDIANAPOLIS 17
(RCA DOME, 12/21/03)**

The Broncos clinched their first playoff birth since 2000 with a 31-17 win against Indianapolis at the RCA Dome in front of 57,149 fans. The Broncos, who bolted to 28 first-half points, dominated the game's time of possession, aided by rookie running back Quentin Griffin's 136 yards rushing on 22 carries in relief of the injured Clinton Portis. Wide receiver Ashley Lelie added 115 yards receiving and quarterback Jake Plummer threw for 238 yards as the offense racked up 465 total yards, including 227 on the ground.

Denver got off to a frightening start when Plummer threw an interception that was returned 31 yards for a touchdown on the team's opening drive. On their next drive, however, the Broncos quickly got back on track after Plummer hit Lelie for a 60-yard pass on Denver's first play, and five plays later, scored on a 2-yard Mike Anderson touchdown run to tie the game at seven. After forcing the Colts to go three-and-out, Denver took over on its own 43-yard line and drove 57-yards, scoring on Plummer's 6-yard quarterback draw, and taking a 14-7 lead.

When Indianapolis tied the game at 14 early in the second quarter on a 16-yard run by Edgerrin James, the rest of the half belonged to the Broncos, as Denver added two touchdowns. The first capped a 12-play, 81-yard drive that consumed almost eight minutes and was culminated by a 1-yard Plummer run. The second touchdown—set up by Griffin's 22-yard run down to the Colts' 16-yard line—came after Plummer floated a 15-yard touchdown pass to Rod Smith, giving Denver a 28-14 lead. The Colts added a 40-yard Mike Vanderjagt field goal late in half, and Denver led 28-17 going into the locker room at the half.

In the second half, Denver's defense took control and held the Colts without a score. The Broncos held the Colts to just 98 second-half yards, including just 20 on the ground. Denver added a field goal late in the fourth quarter bringing its lead to 31-17.

A huge key for the Broncos was their domination in time of possession. Denver held the ball for a team-record 44:58 minutes and limited the Colts to just 15:02. Denver also doubled Indianapolis in total yards, outgaining the Colts 465 to 183.

The playoff berth—Denver's first since 2000—was the fifth by the Broncos in Head Coach Mike Shanahan's tenure.

**THE LAST TIME (POSTSEASON)
at INDIANAPOLIS 41, DENVER 10
(RCA DOME, 1/4/04)**

Denver suffered a 41-10 loss to Indianapolis in the AFC Wild Card Playoff Game in front of 55,331 fans at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis. The Colts jumped out to a 14-3 first-quarter lead and outscored the Broncos 31-3 in the first half.

On the game's opening drive, Peyton Manning led the Colts 70 yards and capped the drive when he found Brandon Stokley for a 31-yard touchdown and an early lead. Denver answered on its first drive but could only manage a 49-yard Jason Elam field goal after penalties caused the drive to stall.

Late in the first quarter, Manning hit Marvin Harrison, who fell near the Colts' 29-yard line, and after not being touched by a Broncos' defender, got up and ran the ball in for a touchdown, and a 14-3 lead. With Denver unable to sustain a drive after picking up two holding penalties, Indianapolis took possession on its 20-yard-line after a Broncos punt. Manning engineered another successful TD drive (8 plays, 80 yards), culminating in a 23-yard touchdown pass to Harrison. After another Denver punt, Manning hit Stokley in stride and scampered 87 yards for a touchdown, giving the Colts a 28-3 lead with less than two minutes remaining in the half. Denver began to mount a drive, but Plummer's pass, intended for Rod Smith, was intercepted by David Macklin and returned 21 yards to the Colts' 42-yard-line. Indianapolis drove down, and Mike Vanderjagt's 27-yard field goal gave the Colts a 31-3 halftime lead.

On their first drive of the second half, Plummer connected with Rod Smith for a 34-yard reception, moving the Broncos to the Colts' 27-yard line, but Elam's 28-yard field goal attempt was blocked and the Colts took over on their own 36-yard line. Indianapolis was able to add to its lead by capping a 64-yard drive with a 7-yard touchdown pass from Manning to Reggie Wayne. Plummer—when hit from behind by Dwight Freeney—fumbled on Denver's next possession, and the ball was recovered by Rob Morris on Denver's 20-yard line. Indianapolis settled for a 20-yard field goal and a 41-3 lead. Midway through the fourth quarter—after recovering a Colts' fumble on its 38-yard-line—Denver finally found the end zone on the game's final score when Plummer found Rod Smith for a 7-yard touchdown.

Plummer completed 23-of-30 passes for 181 yards and a touchdown but tossed a pair of interceptions. Clinton Portis led the Broncos with 68 yards rushing, and rookie Quentin Griffin added 60 yards on six carries. Smith pitched in with five catches for 66 yards, and Shannon Sharpe also caught five balls for 31 yards. Stokley and Harrison each reached the 100-yard receiving plateau, gaining 144 and 133 yards respectively, and Manning completed 22-of-26 passes for 377 yards, five touchdowns and a 158.3 passer rating.

WEEK 16: DENVER 37, at TENNESSEE 16 (THE COLISEUM, 12/25/04)

Reuben Droughns scored three touchdowns and defensive end Reggie Hayward registered three sacks to help the Broncos keep their playoff hopes alive with a 37-16 victory at Tennessee before an ESPN national television audience on Christmas night.

Denver dominated offensively with 496 total yards and 26 first downs and the defense held Tennessee to just 153 yards while racking up six sacks and forcing two turnovers.

Droughns got it rolling for the Broncos on their first drive of the game with a 23-yard touchdown off a screen pass from quarterback Jake Plummer. After linebacker D.J. Williams intercepted Titans quarterback Billy Volek on Tennessee's first offensive play, kicker Jason Elam knocked in a 22-yard field goal to put the Broncos ahead 10-0.

Droughns scored his second touchdown of the day on an 8-yard run to cap off a 17-point first quarter for Denver. The Broncos built a 24-10 lead after Plummer connected with wide receiver Rod Smith for a 7-yard touchdown pass to close out an eight-play, 56-yard drive in the second quarter.

Two Titans field goals slashed Denver's lead to 24-16 at the half, but it would be all the points the Broncos would allow the rest of the contest. Elam kicked two more second half field goals for the Broncos and Droughns put the game out of reach in the fourth quarter with a 23-yard touchdown run that was set up by a 45-yard pass from Plummer to Ashley Lelie, who surpassed 1,000 yards receiving for the season on the catch.

Hayward and the Broncos defense swarmed Volek all night long, limiting him to just 111 yards passing after he had thrown for 400-plus yards and four touchdowns in each of his previous two games. Offensively, Plummer posted a 124.8 passer rating by completing 21 of 26 passes for 303 yards and two touchdowns. Droughns finished with 91 yards rushing, while Lelie led all receivers with 88 yards on three catches.

The win, which lifted Denver to 9-6, was the 100th regular-season win with the Broncos for Head Coach Mike Shanahan.

HEAD COACH MIKE SHANAHAN MONDAY QUOTES

Injury report following Denver's win at Tennessee

"Really the only injury we had is Garrison Hearst. He broke his (left) hand and he will go on (injured reserve). The injury is four to six weeks, and he's got to have a full cast."

On if DL Trevor Pryce will play this weekend vs. Indianapolis

"We'll get a chance to look at him this week and see how much he improved from last week. Last week, watching him, I would not have played him against Tennessee because he didn't practice at the level that he needed to practice at to be functional in a game. So, hopefully this week if he makes as much progress as he did the week before and if he does he'll be ready to play, and if not, he won't."

On the Broncos controlling their playoff future

"It's always nice to be in control. I really don't get too uptight about it until it's the last week. You've got to concentrate on your job and you never know what's going to happen, but it's sure nice to know that you're in control."

On being concerned with Denver's depth at running back

"We've had guys that have stepped up in a lot of positions. We've had three (running) backs go down and guys have stepped up. We've had three defensive backs go down and guys have stepped up. We really had four backs go down, we've had three defensive linemen go down and guys have stepped up. So, we've been expecting guys to step up and get the job done."

On if he expects Indianapolis to play its starters Sunday

"Oh yeah. If you expect anything other than that, you're falling into a trap."

On if the Colts being locked in a playoff seed entering their final game is similar to the situation Denver was in last season

"Everybody looks at it differently. I'm not really sure how Indy perceives their situation. I don't expect to try and figure anything out. All that I know is that I've got to get our football team ready, and we've got to win this football game to get in the playoffs. There will be a lot of speculation about it by everybody in this room, and our players can't fall into a trap by listening to you guys the whole week about how they're not going to play their starters. If they do that, then you get beat. Our football team has to be ready to get their best shot because we know we'll get their best shot, and we'll play it from there."

On the play of Denver's defensive line against Tennessee

"Any time you get as many sacks (6) as we did and you hold a team to 150 yards that's been averaging about 450 then you feel pretty good about a lot of guys playing together. You've got to be effective as a whole defense to accomplish what we accomplished against a football team. But when you allow 150 yards for a team, that means everybody's playing pretty good. We didn't play as good as we would've liked to in the first quarter, but we seemed to get our poise and composure and started playing pretty good after that."

On if this is DE Reggie Hayward's best season of his career

"Well, he played pretty good the season before. He got an opportunity with Bert Berry gone to show what he can do full time and he's done a good job."

His reaction to Reggie White's passing

"(My reaction was) probably like everybody else's. Just what a great guy he was. He was one of the few guys that if you ever spent any time around, you kind of felt like he was a guy that really cared about people—nothing to do with football. He was one of those guys that would embrace you and talk to you. When I was at San Francisco, we brought him out and thought there was a chance to sign him as a free agent but he wound up going to Green Bay. But I had a chance to spend a couple evenings with him and I was really impressed with the type of person he was and how he handled himself. Obviously, I couldn't believe it when I heard it."

On how the Colts rank among the NFL's all-time best offenses

"Obviously, they're right up there with some of the best all-time with the type of stats they've been throwing up. Any time you're rated No. 1 in passing and total offense and point production, you know you're doing a pretty good job. They've got a lot of weapons. They're very well coached and very productive."

On Colts quarterback Peyton Manning

"He's very sharp. He knows defenses. He knows blitzes. He has an uncanny feel for when to get rid of the ball and who to throw it to. He's something. He's just a great quarterback. All his accolades are well deserved."

BRONCOS HEAD COACH MIKE SHANAHAN

Mike Shanahan in 2004 completes a full decade as head coach of the Denver Broncos, and that decade of measurement against the game's all-time coaches places him among the pro football elite. After the team's 23-13 win over San Diego (9/26), he joined the exclusive club of head coaches to post 100 wins in the first 10 seasons with one club.

No head coach in the NFL has won more games than Mike Shanahan's 107 victories since the start of the 1995 season. Those 107 wins include seven straight in the playoffs (he is the only coach to have produced seven playoff wins in two years) during the 1997 and 1998 World Championship seasons, years in which he firmly established himself among the game's sideline greats. His postseason percentage of .700, on a 7-3 record, is second only to Vince Lombardi (9-1, .900) among coaches with more than five playoff victories.

Under Shanahan's guidance, Denver has: Posted the most wins in pro football history in a two-year period (33 in 1997-98); posted the most wins in pro football history in a three-year period (46 in 1996-98); won the most postseason games ever in a two-year period (seven, 1997-98); won 18 straight games over 1997-98 to tie the all-time NFL record for consecutive wins; been undefeated for three straight regular seasons at home (1996-98), just the second team ever to do so; and posted a 22-2 record in its last 24 games during the back-to-back title years.

He produced consecutive Super Bowl titles, three straight 13-plus win seasons (including postseason), and two AFC West titles from 1996-98. Shanahan led Denver to a 14-2 regular season mark and a 3-0 postseason mark in 1998, taking the Broncos back to the victorious Super Bowl glory they experienced in 1997. In his third season with the Broncos in 1997, Shanahan not only led the Broncos back to the Super Bowl for the first time in eight years, but he directed them to their first ever Super Bowl victory. Only Red Miller (1st year) in 1977 got a Broncos' team to the Super Bowl faster than Shanahan did.

In his 10th year with Denver, he has fashioned a franchise-record regular season home mark of **61-18 (.772)**, a regular season mark of **100-59 (.629)**, and an overall mark of **107-62**

(.633). His NFL record as a head coach in regular-season play is **108-71 (.603)** and his overall record is **115-74 (.608)**.

Over the last 12 years (ninth in Denver and the previous three in San Francisco) Mike Shanahan's offenses have finished number one in the NFL four times, second twice and third twice; in two of those campaigns Denver was just 17 yards and 83 yards short of the number one spot.

In 1998 the defending world champions stormed to their second straight title with an offense that scored 501 points and finished third in the NFL in total yards, while the defense had another spectacular postseason, allowing just 25 points and two touchdowns while sparking a remarkable 13-1 turnover ratio in the playoffs.

In 1997 he directed a Denver offense that scored a total of 583 points (29.2 per game) during the entire 1997 season, the fifth highest total in NFL history and the second highest total in AFC history for a combined regular and postseason. Of course, in 1998 Shanahan's Broncos topped that mark by producing 596 regular and postseason points. The all-time high of 636 points came from the 1994 World Champion San Francisco 49ers, for whom Shanahan was the offensive coordinator.

He led his team to a 12-4 regular season record in 1997, marking the first time in franchise history that the team won 12 or more games in back-to-back seasons.

During his NFL career, Shanahan has been a part of teams that have played in nine conference Championship Games, in addition to his six Super Bowl appearances (three victories), five with Denver and Super Bowl XXIX with San Francisco. In his 26 seasons as a pro and college coach, Shanahan's teams have participated in postseason or bowl games 21 times. Shanahan is a graduate of Eastern Illinois University, and also has a master's degree from that institution.

COLTS HEAD COACH TONY DUNGY

Tony Dungy became head coach of the Colts on January 22, 2002. He has directed the Colts to 10-6 and 12-4 records, joining Don McCafferty (1970-71) and Ted Marchibroda (1975-76) as the only coaches in club history to produce 10+ victories and playoff berths in the first two seasons with the team.

Dungy held a 54-42 record as head coach with Tampa Bay from 1996-2001, qualifying for the playoffs four times in six seasons. Dungy has directed Indianapolis (2003) and Tampa Bay (1999) to the conference championship game in earning six postseason appearances in eight seasons as a head coach.

In 2003, Dungy helped produce the 13th 10+-victory season in franchise history, and he is one of five Colts head coaches to earn double-digit victory totals (4, Shula; 3, Marchibroda; 2, McCafferty; 2, Jim Mora). Dungy has five career double-digit victory seasons (11-5, 1999; 10-6, 1997; 10-6, 2000 with Tampa Bay; 12-4, 2003; 10-6, 2002 with Colts) and stands as the only NFL head coach to defeat all 32 NFL teams.

Last year under Dungy, the Colts posted only the eighth season in club history without having consecutive losses (1964, 1967, 1968, 1970, 1971, 1976, 1999, 2003). Dungy produced some of the NFL's stingiest defenses during his years at Tampa

Bay. His units ranked no lower than 11th during his stay and ranked 6th or higher in four of his last five years.

Dungy also served 1981-88 with Pittsburgh, including 1984-88 as defensive coordinator. After serving 1989-91 as DB Coach at Kansas City, Dungy was the defensive coordinator at Minnesota from 1992-95. During his years in Minnesota, the Vikings intercepted an NFL-high 95 passes and made three playoff appearances. The Chiefs made two playoff appearances during Dungy's tenure. At Pittsburgh in 1984, he became the NFL's youngest coordinator (age 25).

In 18 years as a head coach or coordinator, Dungy's troops have ranked in the top 10 in the NFL 11 times. In five seasons as Pittsburgh's coordinator, the Steelers averaged 24 interceptions and 37 takeaways, while scoring 20 touchdowns. Dungy entered the coaching ranks in 1980 at his alma mater, Minnesota, where he was a quarterback (1973-76). He made the Steelers as a free agent in 1977 and was a member of the Super Bowl XIII title team, then was traded to San Francisco in 1979. Dungy is a native of Jackson, Mich.

BRONCOS CHAMPIONS IN THE COMMUNITY

John Lynch will host his Lynch's Christmas Party on Tuesday, Dec. 14 at the Denver Center for the Performing Arts. A total of 30 kids from all six Boys and Girls Club of Metro Denver enjoyed a party with holiday treats and received gifts from John and Linda Lynch. Following the party, the kids watched the "Radio City Christmas Spectacular" starring the Rockettes.

Jake Plummer took 40 children from the Family Tree to shop and Target in the morning on Dec. 14 and took another 25 children from the Family Tree to shop at Sports Authority that afternoon. In addition, the LoDo Rio Grande Mexican restaurant donated 20 percent of their proceeds for the day to the Jake Plummer Foundation.

The Denver Broncos Holiday Party was held Dec. 7 at INVESCO Field at Mile High. Families submitted by the Denver Rescue Mission and the Salvation Army had the opportunity to enjoy holiday treats and a visit from Santa Claus. Players, cheerleaders, Miles and Thunder were on hand to help distribute a gift to all of the children.

The Denver Broncos honored their nominees for the Walter Payton Man of the Year 2004 awards at a private dinner on Thursday, Nov. 18. Jake Plummer, John Lynch, Rod Smith and Al Wilson were chosen and their community work was presented to a committee that chose Rod Smith as the organization's overall award winner. Smith will be the team's nomination for the NFL's Walter Payton Man of the Year award.

The Walter Payton Man of the Year award NFL's most prestigious off-field honor and is the only league honor bestowed on players who demonstrate excellence in their civic and professional responsibilities. The award is given at the end of each season to the NFL player who best provides leadership for his teammates on the gridiron and his fellow citizens in the community. This marks the 24th consecutive season in which the Broncos have had at least one player selected to the Pro Bowl. Bailey, in his sixth season in the NFL and first with the Broncos, returns to the Pro Bowl for the fifth consecutive time in his career. And Lynch, in his first season with Broncos after playing 11 for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, will go to Hawaii for the sixth time in his career. The Broncos currently have 11 players on their roster who have been to a total of 34 Pro Bowls, of which 20 have come as Broncos.

CENTURY MARK AND BEYOND

The Denver Broncos have had one of the most potent rushing attacks in the NFL since Head Coach Mike Shanahan took over in 1995. In addition to having five different running backs rush for over 1,000 yards in a season (Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike Anderson, Clinton Portis and Reuben Droughns, who eclipsed the 1,000 yard mark in Week 13 vs. Miami), the Broncos are tops in the NFL with most individual 100-yard games with 75, including eight this season (six by Reuben Droughns, and one each by Quentin Griffin and Tatum Bell). THE DROUGHNS FILE

In Denver's 20-17 win over Miami, Reuben Droughns rushed for 62 yards on 18 carries, and eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark. On the season, he has 1,164 yards rushing on 260 carries (4.5) and six touchdowns. He is the fifth different running back under Head Coach Mike Shanahan to go over 1,000 yards in a season (Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike Anderson and Clinton Portis).

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER

In his fifth NFL season, Reuben Droughns eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark for the first time in his Broncos career Dec. 12 vs. Miami (currently sits with 1,164 yards on 260 carries). Along with former Denver running back Floyd Little, who also was a first-time 1,000-yard rusher in his fifth NFL season, that is the latest in a career that a Bronco has reached 1,000 yards for the first time.

The Broncos won their season opener for the fourth straight year by defeating division rival Kansas City, 34-24, in front of 75,939 fans at INVESCO field at Mile High and a national television audience on ESPN's Sunday Night Football. Second-year running back Quentin Griffin, in just his second career start, led the Broncos charge with three touchdowns (2 rush, 1 rec) and 156 yards rushing on 23 carries, setting a new franchise record for rushing yards in a season opener. Kansas City jumped on Denver early after running back Priest Holmes' 2-yard touchdown run completed an eight-play, 80-yard drive on the game's opening drive.

After a quarterback field goal by Jason Elam narrowed the gap for the Broncos, Denver took a 10-7 lead early in the second quarter when quarterback Jake Plummer hit Griffin for a 1-yard touchdown. The Broncos defense stuffed the Chiefs once again to regain the ball, setting the stage for Griffin's second touchdown—a 25-yard scamper in which the tailback slashed through several defenders en route to the end zone.

Denver opened the second half with a 17-7 lead, but the Chiefs quickly got back in the game after capitalizing on two Broncos turnovers. Plummer's first pass of the half was intercepted by Kansas City linebacker Monty Bessel, setting up a 50-yard field goal by Lawrence Lynch. On the Broncos' next possession, a solid Kansas City pass rush on third down forced Plummer to errantly heave the ball in the air and right into the hands of linebacker Shawn Barber (deep in Broncos' territory). The Chiefs took advantage when Holmes scored his second touchdown of the contest on a 4-yard run tying the score at 17-7.

Griffin stepped up once again on Denver's next drive, as he burst up the middle for a 47-yard touchdown run, the longest of his career. Holmes' day was not finished, however, as he tied the game on a 33-yard touchdown run, his third of the game, to knot the score at 24-24.

Elam helped the Broncos regain the lead after he booted a 45-yard field goal, and on the Kansas City's next possession, Denver's defense forced the Chiefs to punt. The Broncos responded with a 13-play, 87-yard drive that burned 7:10 on the clock and was capped by a 2-yard touchdown pass from Plummer to tight end Patrick Hape, securing the win for the Broncos.

Denver's offense amassed 413 total yards, including 202 on the ground. Defensive back Champ Bailey was solid in his Broncos debut, notching his 19th career interception in the second quarter and also doubled up as a wide receiver, catching one pass for 11 yards.

The Broncos improved to 3-1 with a hard-fought 16-13 road victory over Tampa Bay before a crowd of 65,341 at Raymond James Stadium.

The game marked the return of Broncos safety John Lynch to the city in which he played 11 years, and the team he helped lead to a World Championship in 2002.

Denver struck first after a hit by safety Keny Kenney forced Bucs receiver Charles Lee to fumble the ball which was recovered by cornerback Willie Middlebrooks. The Broncos capped off a 43-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Jake Plummer to tight end Patrick Happe to take a 7-0 lead.

Early in the second quarter, Denver increased its lead to 10-0 after Plummer hit tight end Jeb Putzier for a 28-yard completion, setting up a 49-yard field goal by Jason Elam. Tampa Bay countered on its next drive when Brad Johnson found wide receiver Michael Clayton for a 51-yard field goal.

After Elam's second field goal of the game (50-yards) gave Denver a 13-7 lead, the Buccaneers mounted a 62-yard drive which culminated in a Martin Gramatica field goal from 28 yards out, cutting the score to 13-10 at halftime.

On their first possession of the second half, the Buccaneers drove down to the Denver 16-yard line, but Denver's defense stepped up, and held Tampa Bay to a 30-yard Gramatica field goal that knotted the game at 13.

In the fourth quarter, however, the Broncos showed their dominance, as they constructed an 84-yard drive that chewed up 6:32 on the clock, and resulted in a 23-yard field goal by Elam, which proved to be the game-winner.

Tampa Bay's Jameel Williams returned the ensuing kickoff 44-yards to the Bucs' 45-yard line, but the Denver's defense once again took control. Middlebrooks knocked down a Johnson pass, attempt to wide receiver Tim Brown on 3rd-and-3, forcing Tampa Bay to punt. Denver's offense then insured the win as they killed over seven minutes of the clock, before giving Tampa Bay the ball with just three seconds left in the game. Denver limited the Buccaneers to just 7 yards of total offense in the fourth quarter, and dominated the time of possession (13:20 to 1:40).

In his return to Tampa Bay, Lynch put in a solid effort, delivering several punishing hits and recording seven tackles and two passes defensed. Rookie linebacker D.J. Williams aided the solid defensive effort, leading the team with nine tackles.

After a slow start—just 12 yards rushing in the first-half—Quentin Griffin finished strong with 66 yards, including 48 coming in the fourth quarter.

Running back Reuben Droughns rumbled for 193 rushing yards and Ashley Lelie caught a key fourth-quarter touchdown pass to help the Broncos start 4-1 for the third straight year, with a 20-17 win over the NFC Defending Champion Carolina Panthers before a crowd of 75,072 at INVESCO Field at Mile High.

Droughns—making his first career start at running back in place of the injured Quentin Griffin—proved there would be no drop-off in production, when on the first Denver drive, his 32-yard run led to a Jason Elam 32-yard field goal.

After the Broncos defense forced a Carolina punt, an eight-play, 62-yard drive yielded another Elam field goal, this time from 33-yards out to give his team an early 6-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Panthers would take the lead in the second quarter on a 26-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jake Delhomme to wide receiver Kenny Colbert. But, after John Kasay booted a 53-yard field goal, increasing Carolina's lead to 10-6, the Broncos drove 76 yards in seven plays and regained the lead with a touchdown. Quarterback Jake Plummer hit Droughns on a 5-yard pass, and Denver took a 13-10 lead.

On the Broncos' first drive of the second half, the team was poised to score after driving down to the Carolina 1-yard line, but Plummer threw an interception to defensive end Julius Peppers on 4th-and-goal. Peppers returned the pick 101 yards and was brought down at the 3-yard-line by Rod Smith. The Panthers would score on a one-yard run by Delhomme to give his team a 17-13 lead after the longest non-scoring interception return in NFL history by Peppers.

Despite the setback, Plummer took charge on the team's first possession of the fourth quarter, and on 3-and-7 from Carolina's 57-yard line, Plummer fired a pass in to the end zone for Lelie, who jumped and made an acrobatic grab for what would prove to be the game-winning score.

Carolina had a chance to tie the game at 20 with a 42-yard field goal attempt, but a false start penalty on Rich Tyski followed by an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on Matt Willing for throwing the flag at the referee, pushed the Panthers out of field goal range forcing them to punt. The Broncos got the ball back with 6:42 remaining and sustained a drive which ran out the clock. The drive was highlighted by a key 14-yard reception by rookie receiver Darious Watts, converting a key 3rd-and-3.

Droughns' 193 yards on the ground was the ninth best rushing total in franchise history, and the most by a Broncos back in his starting debut at the position.

With Elam's second field goal of the game, he became the 16th player in NFL history to hit 300 career field goals, and the fastest ever to reach the feat, needing only 177 games (John Carney held the previous record at 188 games).

The Broncos dominated on both sides of the ball to improve to 5-1 on the season with a 31-3 victory over rival Oakland in front of 62,507 at the Network Associates Coliseum.

Quarterback Jake Plummer tossed three touchdowns and Reuben Droughins rushed for 176 yards on 38 carries to pace the Denver offense attack while the Broncos' top-ranked defense shut down the Raiders, limiting them to just 145 total yards. The Raiders scored first with a 35-yard Sebastian Janikowski field goal, which was set up after linebacker Marques Anderson intercepted a Jake Plummer pass early in the first quarter.

The Broncos responded quickly on the ensuing drive as Plummer found tight end Jeb Putzier in the end zone for a 12-yard score to give his team a 7-3 lead.

Denver wasted no time after getting the ball back at the start of the second quarter as they put together a seven-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 10-yard touchdown pass from Plummer to tight end Dwayne Carswell.

Plummer threw his third touchdown pass of the first half, a 31-yard strike to wide receiver Ashley Leite, with 4:03 remaining in the second quarter to give Denver a commanding 21-3 advantage.

After Jason Elam booted a 33-yard field goal increasing the Broncos lead in the third quarter, Droughins capped off the scoring with a 4-yard touchdown run, the second rushing touchdown of his career.

Plummer finished the day 11-of-20 passing for 190 yards, three touchdowns and a 106.2 passer rating, while Putzier led all receivers with three receptions for 52 yards and a touchdown in the game.

The victory, Denver's fourth consecutive of the season, also marked Denver's fourth straight win over the Raiders and bumped Mike Shanahan's record to 15-4 overall against Oakland.

On a snowy, frigid evening at INVESCO Field at Mile High, Oakland rallied from an 11-point deficit in the fourth quarter to send the Broncos to a 25-24 defeat in front of a national-television audience on ESPN's *Sunday Night Football* and 75,936 fans. The Broncos had a chance to win the game after Jake Plummer drove his team downfield in the final minutes of the contest, but a 43-yard Jason Elam field goal attempt was blocked by tackle Langston Walker to seal the victory for Oakland.

Ahead 3-0 in the second quarter, Plummer found wide receiver Rod Smith deep for an 85-yard touchdown pass, giving Denver a 10-0 lead. It marked the eighth-longest pass play in Broncos history, and set career-highs in yardage for both players. Oakland rebounded quickly as Doug Gabriel returned the kickoff to the Raiders 49-yard line, setting up a 42-yard touchdown pass from Kerry Collins to wide receiver Jerry Porter with just 23 seconds remaining in the half.

Oakland capitalized off a Reuben Droughins fumble at the start of the second half with a 14-yard touchdown pass from Collins to Porter, and took a 13-10 lead. Denver regained control of the game in the fourth quarter, as Plummer found wide receiver Ashley Lelie for a 57-yard strike which set up a Droughins 3-yard touchdown run, putting the Broncos ahead 17-13. The Broncos upped their lead on Oakland's next drive, as defensive tackle Monsanto Pope tipped a Collins pass at the line of scrimmage which was intercepted by Ellis Johnson, who returned it 32 yards for the score.

With the Broncos holding a 24-13 advantage with six minutes remaining in the game, the Raiders mounted a comeback beginning with a 6-yard touchdown pass from Collins to Ronald Curry, bringing Oakland within five after missing a two-point conversion attempt.

After a 63-yard pass from Collins to Curry brought the Raiders to the Denver 10-yard line, they would take the lead on Porter's third touchdown reception of the game, a five-yard pass from Collins on 4th-and-goal from the 5-yard line with 1:49 left to play in the game.

Down by one, Plummer completed passes of 16, 14, and 12 yards to set up a 43-yard field goal attempt by Elam, but Oakland's Langston Walker batted down the kick to end Denver's comeback hopes.

Droughins finished the game with 102 yards rushing on 28 attempts, his sixth 100-yard game in the past seven, while Plummer completed 14-of-23 passes for 245 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

Kicker Jason Elam's 50-yard field goal in the game's final minutes lifted the Broncos to a 20-17 victory over the Miami Dolphins before a crowd of 75,027 at INVESCO Field at Mile High.

The Broncos, who improved to 8-5 on the season with the win, amassed 415 yards of total offense, including 196 yards on the ground, while limiting Miami to 214 yards total.

Late in the first quarter, the Dolphins capitalized on a Lake Plummer interception when quarterback A.J. Feeley hit Marty Booker for an 8-yard touchdown. Denver tied the game early in the second quarter on a 7-yard touchdown run by rookie Tatum Bell, who finished the game with 123 yards rushing on 17 carries, the first 100-yard performance of his career.

Feeley drove Miami back down the field on the ensuing drive and found tight end Randy McMichael for a 21-yard gain to set up an 11-yard touchdown run by running back Sammy Morris.

With less than two minutes left in the half, Plummer completed three consecutive passes to move the Broncos down to the 11-yard line. Bell scored his second touchdown of the game (third of his career) on the next play with an 11-yard run that knocked the game at 14-14.

After inbacker Al Wilson intercepted a pass by Feeley on the first play of the second half, Elam hit a field goal from 20 yards out to give the Broncos the lead. Dolphins kicker Olindo Mare returned the favor with a 32-yard field goal later in the third quarter to tie the contest at 17.

The teams traded possessions until late in the fourth quarter when Reuben Droughms came up big with a 21-yard run that put Denver on Miami's 34-yard line. The run set the stage for Elam, as he knocked the ball through the uprights for the 16th game-winning field goal of his career with 2:55 remaining.

Miami had once last chance, and on a 4th-and-3 at the Dolphins' 39-yard line Broncos cornerback Kelly Herndon knocked a Feeley pass down and Denver would run the clock out to secure the win.

Bell had a breakout game despite leaving early with a separated left shoulder, posting 123 yards on 17 carries and the two touchdowns. Droughms finished with 62 yards on 18 carries and Rod Smith led all receivers with eight catches for 97 yards.

The Denver Broncos dropped to 8-6 after a 45-17 loss to the Kansas City Chiefs in front of 77,702 at Arrowhead Stadium. Kansas City came on strong right out of gate, as Dante Hall took the opening kickoff 97-yards for a touchdown, and Chiefs running back Larry Johnson put his team ahead 14-0 with a 5-yard touchdown run to cap off an 87-yard drive. The Broncos got on the board at the end of the first quarter, when quarterback Jake Plummer found wide receiver Rod Smith for a 22-yard touchdown. Denver got the ball back and began driving down for a potential tying touchdown, but Plummer was intercepted by Dexter McCleon, his first of two interceptions.

The Chiefs capitalized when Trent Green hit wide receiver Eddie Kennison for a 7-yard score, and Kansas City followed that with a 32-yard touchdown scamper by Johnson, giving the Chiefs a commanding 28-7 second-quarter lead. Denver would pull to within 28-10 on a 27-yard field goal by Jason Elam to end the first half.

Two touchdown passes by Green early in the third quarter capped off drives of 90 and 99 yards for the Kansas City offense, giving the Chiefs a 42-10 lead. Denver's only points of the second half came on a 4-yard touchdown by running back Garrison Hearst. Smith, who paced Denver receivers with six catches for 75 yards, became just the 20th receiver in NFL history to reach 700-career receptions, and moved into 20th place all-time in NFL history in receptions. Tatum Bell led the Broncos in rushing with 50 yards on nine carries while Plummer completed 23-of-41 passes for 292 yards. Both teams amassed over 400 yards of total offense for the game.

- He ranks third in the AFC (5th in NFL) with 3,843 passing yards and ranks third in the AFC (T-7th in NFL) with 286 completions.
- In 15 games this season, Plummer has set a single-season career high in touchdown passes with 25 (he previously threw 18 touchdowns in 2001 and 2002 with the Cardinals).
- His 25 touchdown passes rank fifth in the AFC (9th in NFL), and he passed Frank Tripucka (24 in 1960) at Tenn. (12/15) for fifth all-time on the Broncos' single-season touchdown list.
- Plummer became only the second quarterback in Broncos history (Craig Morton in 1981) to throw eight touchdowns in a two-game span with four scoring passes vs. Hou. (11/7) and vs. Atl. (10/31).
- His four touchdown passes vs. Hou. (11/7) tied a career high and marked his fourth career four-touchdown game to help him achieve a single-game career-best 137.8 passer rating.
- In throwing for 499 yards vs. Atl. (10/31), Plummer posted the ninth-highest single-game yardage total in NFL history and the highest single-game total in Broncos history.
- His 499 passing yards vs. Atl. (10/31) marked the highest single-game passing total of any quarterback this season.
- His 85-yard touchdown strike to Rod Smith in snowy conditions vs. Oak. (11/28) was the longest pass of his career and the eighth-longest passing play in team history.
- He has 26 career game-winning or game-tying scoring drive in the fourth quarter or overtime. Nineteen are "pure" comeback victories, the highest total of any QB since 1995.
- Including this season's totals, Plummer is 18-8 (69.2%) as a Broncos starter (2003-present) during the regular season, marking the fourth-highest winning percentage of any NFL quarterback during that period (Tom Brady, 27-4, 87.1%, Donovan McNabb, 25-5, 83.3% and Peyton Manning, 24-7, 77.4%).
- Plummer was voted an offensive co-captain by his teammates, joining receiver Rod Smith in that role.

2004 Regular Season:

Plummer's creativity behind center has resulted in several miraculous performances this season as he has completed 286-of-491 passes (58.2%) for 3,843 yards with 25 touchdowns and 20 interceptions in starting all 15 games. **An offensive co-captain, Plummer ranks third in the AFC (5th in NFL) in passing yards and ranks third in the AFC (T-7th in NFL) in completions.** His touchdown total, a single-season career high, ranks fifth in the AFC (9th in NFL). Plummer completed his first eight passes at Tenn. (12/25) and ended the first quarter with a perfect 158.3 passer rating on the way to completing 21-of-26 passes (80.1%) for 303 yards, two touchdowns and one interception for a final 124.8 rating. **His stellar play against the Titans moved the quarterback into fifth place on Denver's all-time single-season touchdown list (ahead of Frank Tripucka — 24 in 1960) and into fourth place on the Broncos' all-time single-season passing yards list (ahead of John Elway — 3,635 in 1997).** At K.C. (12/19), Plummer completed 23-of-41 passes (56.1%) for 292 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions while also recording a season-best 22-yard run on a scramble. **His touchdown pass, a 22-yarder to Rod Smith, in Kansas City moved him ahead of John Elway (22 in 1985 and 1998) into sixth place on the Broncos' all-time single-season touchdown list.** He did not throw a touchdown pass and had two interceptions vs. Mia. (12/12), but the quarterback made several key throws in a 16-of-30 (53.3%), 219-yard performance. He completed three passes for 59 yards to three different Broncos (Darius Watts, Ashley Lelie and Rod Smith) in the second quarter to put Denver in position for its second touchdown against the Dolphins in a drive that covered 70 yards in only four plays. Against a stingy Chargers defense at S.D. (12/5), Plummer threw for 278 yards on 16-of-40 (40.0%) passing with four interceptions. He completed three passes of 39 or more yards in

San Diego, including a game-long 45-yard pass to Rod Smith on a second-half scoring drive. In snowy, frigid conditions vs. Oak. (11/28), **he completed a career-long 85-yard touchdown pass, the eighth-longest passing play in team history, to Rod Smith** in the second quarter and finished the game 14-of-23 (60.9%) for 245 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Plummer also connected with Ashley Lelie on a 57-yard pass late against the Raiders, which moved Denver to the Oakland 3-yard line and set up a touchdown run on the next play. He was extremely efficient in Denver's game at N.O. (11/21) and finished the day throwing for two touchdown passes, which moved him ahead of Steve Ramsey for seventh place on the Broncos' all-time touchdown passes list (35), and 224 yards on 19-of-29 (65.5%) passing. His play resulted in a 111.9 passer rating, which was his second consecutive game with a passer rating more than 100.0, and a Denver score on its first four possessions to give it a 20-0 first-quarter lead. Against the Saints, he tossed back-to-back passes of 30 or more yards (33 and 37 yds.) on a first-quarter drive to Ashley Lelie with the latter strike a touchdown pass. He concluded Denver's scoring when he connected with fullback Kyle Johnson in stride for a 19-yard score that earned him his seventh multiple-touchdown game this season. **Plummer became only the second quarterback in Broncos history (Craig Morton in 1981) to throw eight touchdowns in a two-game span** with stellar outings vs. Hou. (11/7) and vs. Atl. (10/31). In throwing for four touchdowns and 234 yards in a 16-of-24 performance vs. Hou. (11/7), **Plummer set a single-game career best with a 137.8 passer rating.** He connected with four different Denver players on his scoring passes, including three in the first half to mark the fourth time in his career he accomplished that feat in a half. Against the Texans, he threw a second-quarter strike to Rod Smith that moved the receiver into first place all-time in touchdowns by a Bronco and also connected with Smith on a 9-yard pass in the second quarter to give Smith more receptions than any other player in franchise history. **He posted the ninth-highest single-game yardage mark in NFL history and set a franchise record with 499 passing yards** on 31-of-55 passing (56.3%) with four touchdowns and three interceptions vs. Atl. (10/31). His four touchdowns against the Falcons tied a career high and were spread out to four different receivers on scoring drives that were all 69 yards or longer, including an 80-yard TD strike to Rod Smith in the first quarter that tied for the longest completion of his career (he also threw an 80-yd. TD pass at St. Louis 12/15/02). Additionally, he moved ahead of Steve DeBerg for eighth place on the Broncos' all-time passing yards list against the Falcons. In Denver's lone Monday night appearance and his 100th-career start at Cin. (10/25), Plummer completed 23-of-40 passes for 221 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. He moved into ninth place on the Broncos' all-time passing yardage list (ahead of Micky Slaughter) and passed Steve DeBerg for eighth place on the franchise's all-time completions list against the Bengals. He rolled to his right and found Rod Smith for a 3-yard score in the second quarter, marking the Broncos' only touchdown of the game in Cincinnati. He threw three touchdowns, all of which occurred in the first half, at Oak. (10/17) in passing for 190 yards on 11-of-20 passing with one interception to lead the Broncos' offense to 31 unanswered points. **Plummer led the Broncos to a 28-point win against the Raiders, the largest margin of victory in a road game against the Raiders in franchise history.** His performance at Oakland was his seventh career game with three or more touchdowns, and it marked the third contest in which he threw for three scores in a half. Plummer connected on two of his scoring passes to tight ends while also finding wide receiver Ashley Lelie for a 31-yard score. After throwing a pair of third-quarter interceptions vs. Car. (10/10), Plummer bounced back by directing the Broncos to his 19th-career comeback victory against the Panthers when his 39-yard touchdown pass in the corner of the end zone to Ashley Lelie capped off an 87-yard drive early in the final period. **His comeback against the Panthers marked his 25th game-winning or game-tying scoring drive in the fourth quarter or overtime.** He finished the game against the Panthers with 226 yards on 17-of-29 passing with two touchdowns and two interceptions. He guided Denver to a win at T.B. (10/3) with 138 yards on 13-of-30 passing with one touchdown and no interceptions. Plummer fooled the Buccaneers' defense on a bootleg before throwing a 5-yard score for Denver's lone touchdown. He efficiently managed Denver's offense in the fourth quarter against the Buccaneers as the Broncos held onto the ball for 13:20 in the final period, **ensuring Plummer of his 24th game-winning or game-tying scoring drive in the fourth quarter or overtime.** Plummer threw for a season-high 294 yards and two touchdowns on 25-of-36 passing (69.4%) vs. S.D. (9/26). His 294 passing yards were the most he's had in a game since Nov. 18, 2001, vs. Detroit. He threw a clutch 33-yard touchdown strike to wide receiver Ashley Lelie on fourth-and-9 in the third quarter with the Chargers trailing by only 3. **In the second quarter against the Chargers, he moved into 10th place on the Broncos' all-time passing yards list, ahead of John McCormick.** He threw for a then-season-high 250 yards on 23-of-39 passing with no touchdowns or interceptions at Jac. (9/19) while also scrambling for 24 yards on the ground. He hit wide receiver Ashley Lelie in stride for a 39-yard gain on the Broncos' 10-play, 76-yard drive at the end of the second quarter that set up Denver's second field goal of the game. Plummer directed the Broncos to a win in their season opener vs. K.C. (9/12) by completing 18-of-29 passes (with completions to eight different receivers) for a game-high 230 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. Plummer, who completed a 58-yard pass against the Chiefs and had a career-high eight rushes, also led a pivotal 13-play, 87-yard touchdown drive late in the game that ate up 7:10 and resulted in a 2-yard touchdown pass to seal Denver's win. **The win was his 23rd career game-winning or game-tying fourth-quarter scoring drive in the fourth quarter or overtime**

- With 123 rushing yards vs. Mia. (12/12), Bell joined teammates Reuben Droughns and Quentin Griffin as the third Bronco to post at least one 100-yard game this year, marking only the second time in team history that such a feat has occurred (1995 – Terrell Davis, Glyn Milburn and Aaron Craver).
- Bell scored his first career touchdown on a 16-yard run at S.D. (12/5).
- He made a 58-yard reception on a screen pass, the longest catch of his career, at K.C. (12/19).

2004 Regular Season: Bell has displayed quickness and potential during his rookie season, and the promising running back has rushed 59 times for 305 yards (5.2 avg.) with three touchdowns and caught three passes for 64 yards (21.3 avg.) in 13 games. **Bell joined teammates Reuben Droughns and Quentin Griffin as the third Bronco this season to post at least one 100-yard game (vs. Mia. 12/12), marking only the second time in franchise history that such a feat has occurred.** Bell leads all AFC rookies (5th among NFL rookies) in rushing yards this year. He also recently has begun to show his ability on special teams, making four tackles on coverage units to tie for 10th on the Broncos in that category. Bell recorded 44 yards on 12 carries (3.7 avg.) at Tenn. (12/25) while also catching a 12-yard pass. Despite being hampered by a severe left shoulder injury at K.C. (12/19) that was suffered a week earlier, Bell rushed nine times for 50 yards (5.6 avg.) and made a 58-yard reception out of a short screen pass. He broke away from Chiefs defenders on the run but had the ball knocked out of his hands on the Chiefs' 5-yard line for a touchback. Bell posted the

first 100-yard game of his career vs. Mia. (12/12) with 123 yards on 17 carries (7.2 avg.) with two touchdowns. He exploded for 81 yards in the first half alone against the Dolphins, including slashing touchdown runs of seven and 11 yards, before he was removed from the game late in the third quarter with a sprained left shoulder. Bell had a career-long 29-yard run around the left side early in the third quarter against the Dolphins that set up a 20-yard field goal. **He scored his first career touchdown on a 16-yard run at S.D. (12/5)** and totaled a career-best 31 yards on seven carries (4.4 avg.) during a game in which he saw the most extensive action of his rookie season. Bell played on special teams only vs. Oak. (11/28). He made a team-high three special teams tackles at N.O. (11/21) in a game that did not see him record a rushing statistic. He chased down Saints kick returner Michael Lewis on a second-quarter return during which Lewis used his elusiveness to gain 26 yards before Bell corralled him. Bell competed on special teams vs. Hou. (11/7). He was inactive for Denver's game vs. Atl. (10/31) with a hamstring injury suffered a week earlier. While he did not record a rush at Cin. (10/25) on Monday Night Football, the rookie contributed on special teams against the Bengals. Bell saw the most action he's seen all year at Oak. (10/17) by rushing six times for 25 yards (4.2 avg.). He was a factor on special teams against the Raiders, making the first tackle of his career on that unit. All of his yards against the Raiders came in relief of starter Reuben Droughns in the fourth quarter, including a 13-yard scamper around the left side on third-and-5. In Denver's comeback win vs. Car. (10/10), both of Bell's carries came in the first quarter to give the back a total of five yards for the game. At T.B. (10/3), Bell returned from the rib injury that kept him out of Denver's previous game to play on special teams only against the Buccaneers. He was inactive vs. S.D. (9/26) with a rib injury that he suffered in practice leading up to the game. In Denver's game at Jac. (9/19), Bell backed up Quentin Griffin and rushed four times for 16 yards (4.0 avg.) with three of his four runs coming in the first quarter. Bell primarily saw action on special teams in his NFL debut vs. K.C. (9/12) but did rush on consecutive plays on a fourth-quarter drive to total 11 yards.

2004 Regular Season:

Droughns' bruising running style makes him difficult to tackle after initial contact, and he has rushed for more than 100 yards in six of Denver's last 11 games as its featured running back after beginning the season as a fullback. In 15 games (14 starts), **Droughns leads the Broncos in rushing with 1,164 yards on 260 carries (4.5 avg.) with six touchdowns** while catching 32 passes for 241 yards (7.5 avg.) with two touchdowns. **He is the fifth different Bronco in the last 10 years to rush for more than 1,000 yards and posted the franchise's 16th 1,000-yard season this year.** Additionally, the fifth-year back tied Floyd Little (1971) for the latest in a career that a Bronco has posted his first 1,000-yard season. While only starting 11 games at running back, he ranks seventh in the AFC (10th in NFL) in rushing yards. He has accounted for a team-high 80 first downs (66 rushing, 14 receiving) to tie for fourth in the AFC (T-5th in NFL). Droughns was Denver's primary kick returner for its first five games and has a 24.6 avg. on 14 returns for 344 yards. His production on special teams **earned him AFC Special Teams Player of the Month honors for September to mark the first time a Broncos kick return garnered that award.** Droughns' success on special teams extends to punt and kick coverage, where he has made four tackles to tie for 10th on the team. He posted a career-high three touchdowns (2 rushing, 1 receiving) at **Tenn. (12/25)** along with 91 rushing yards on 22 carries (4.1 avg.). His touchdown catch against the Titans went for a career long 23 yards, and the back also picked up six rushing first downs. In a start at **K.C. (12/19)**, Droughns saw most of his action in the second half and finished the game with four rushes for 27 yards (6.8 avg.), including back-to-back fourth-quarter runs of 14 and 16 yards. He also caught two passes for 14 yards (7.0 avg.) against the Chiefs. **He posted the franchise's 16th 1,000-yard season and the first of his career** after his 18-carry, 62-yard (3.4 avg.) day vs. **Mia. (12/12)**. Droughns, who entered the Dolphins game 16 yards shy of 1,000, primarily was used in a reserve roll behind Tatum Bell but had a key 21-yard run in the fourth quarter that set up a 50-yard field goal that proved to be the game winner. He also returned a kick (17 yds.) for the first time in four weeks against Miami. Droughns had a quiet day at **S.D. (12/5)**, rushing only 14 times (his lowest number of attempts in eight starts at running back this year) for 38 yards (2.7 avg.), including a 4-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. In snowy, frigid conditions vs. **Oak. (11/28)**, Droughns eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the sixth time in his last seven games with 102 yards on 28 carries (3.6 avg.) with a touchdown, a 3-yard score early in the fourth quarter. He recorded the longest run of his career on the Broncos' first play from scrimmage at **N.O. (11/21)** when he took off around the left side on a 51-yard touchdown run as part of the 166 yards he gained on 28 carries (5.9 avg.). Droughns, who also caught two passes for 25 yards against the Saints (12.5 avg.), was difficult to contain in the first half as he gained 106 yards (10.6 avg.) by halftime. He put up solid numbers vs. **Hou. (11/7)** by picking up 120 yards on 29 carries (4.1 avg.). Against the Texans, he gained nearly 40 yards each quarter in one of the most consistent performances of his career. While having a quiet day rushing the ball vs. **Atl. (10/31)** in only gaining 49 yards on 15 carries (3.3 avg.), Droughns posted a career-high six receptions and 63 yards receiving (10.5 avg.) against the Falcons. He eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the third consecutive game at **Cin. (10/25)** on *Monday Night Football*, rushing for 110 yards on 24 carries (4.6 avg.). He also tied a career high with four receptions for 20 yards (5.0 avg.) against the Bengals. Droughns rushed for 49 yards in the second quarter and gained five yards or more on 10 of his final 12 rushes before halftime against the Bengals. He set a franchise record for most carries in a non-overtime game at **Oak. (10/17)** with 38 rushes for 176 yards (4.6 avg.) with one touchdown to earn **FedEx Ground NFL Player of the Week honors. His 38 carries in a game are the most by a running back in the NFL this season.** Droughns had 82 yards in the second quarter against the Raiders, including four runs of more than 10 yards, to help him record the first 100-yard half of his career (103 total yards). With regular starter Quentin Griffin inactive vs. **Car. (10/10)** with an ankle injury, Droughns took advantage of his first start at tailback as a Bronco by rushing for 193 yards on 30 carries (6.4 avg.) to mark the **highest rushing total by a Denver player in his first start at running back and the ninth-highest rushing total by a Broncos back in the regular season (10th in any game).** He registered most of his yards in bruising fashion, and it took several Panthers to bring him down on a 15-yard third-down run in the second quarter that set up his 5-yard receiving touchdown, which was his first score this season. Droughns also caught a career-high four passes for 18 yards while totaling 10 of the Broncos' 23 first downs (8 rushing, 2 receiving) against the Panthers. In addition to returning two kicks for 45 yards (22.5 avg.) at **T.B. (10/3)**, he was used in short-yardage situations as well as on one-back sets and gained a season-high 20 yards on eight carries (2.5 avg.). He pulled Buccaneers defensive back Dwight Smith with him to pick up a tough third-and-1 with Denver at its 19-yard line late in a close game. Droughns gained a career-high 137 yards on four returns (34.3 avg.) vs. **S.D. (9/26)**. All four of his returns that day went for 20 or more yards, including a 48-yarder. He also had a team-high three special teams tackles against San Diego. He returned two kicks for 49 yards (24.5 avg.) at **Jac. (9/19)** while catching his first pass of the year. His 2-yard reception converted a crucial third-and-1 in the third quarter with Denver trailing by 1. In the Broncos' season opener vs. **K.C. (9/12)**, Droughns started at fullback, clearing the way for Quentin Griffin's franchise opening-day record 156 yards, and he was a major contributor on special teams despite battling leg cramps. **He returned two kicks for 58 yards (29.0 avg.) to lead all NFL Wk. 1 players in return yardage.** Droughns began Denver's first possession of the season with a 32-yard return.

2004 Regular Season:

Griffin showed flashes of big-play ability in six games (four starts) at running back **before he was placed on injured reserve Oct. 27 with a torn ACL in his right knee, which was repaired Nov. 9.** Before the injury, he collected 311 yards on 85 carries (3.7 avg.) with two touchdowns while catching 10 passes for 68 yards (6.8 avg.) with a score. The elusive Griffin was used as the Broncos' primary kick returner for two games and gained 52 yards returning four kicks (13.0 avg.) He suffered a torn ACL in his right knee returning a kick on the opening kickoff of the second half at **Cin. (10/25)** on *Monday Night Football* and did not return. Although he did not record a rush against Cincinnati, Griffin returned three kickoffs for 33 yards (11.0 avg.), including a 21-yard return in the second quarter that set up Denver's lone

touchdown drive, before injuring his knee. Back in the lineup after missing the previous week with an ankle injury, Griffin totaled four carries for 16 yards (4.0 avg.) at **Oak. (10/17)**. He returned the first kickoff of his career against the Raiders, taking a first-quarter kick 19 yards to put the Broncos in excellent field position to begin their first touchdown drive of the game. He was inactive vs. **Car. (10/10)** with an ankle injury. The second-year back picked up 66 yards on 21 carries (3.1 avg.) at **T.B. (10/3)**, including 44 fourth-quarter yards, while catching a 15-yard pass. Griffin broke free for a 12-yard run in the fourth quarter that put Denver in position for the field goal that proved to be the game winner. He struggled with the Chargers' 3-4 defense vs. **S.D. (9/26)** and was held to a season-low seven yards on 12 carries (0.6 avg.). One of his three catches against the Chargers went for 22 yards on a swing pass and moved Denver into scoring range early in the second quarter, setting up a field goal. He also had a key block on a Chargers blitz in the third quarter, clearing the way for a 16-yard Jake Plummer completion on a touchdown drive. At **Jac. (9/19)**, the Jaguars' stingy run defense limited Griffin to 66 yards rushing on 25 carries (2.6 avg.), but his five catches for 29 yards (5.8 avg.) were a career high and more than any Jaguars receiver totaled. He was unable to secure Jake Plummer's handoff with the Broncos in position for a game-winning field goal with less than a minute in the game, allowing the Jaguars to end Denver's comeback attempt. Griffin enjoyed a record-setting day vs. **K.C. (9/12)** as **he set a franchise record for most rushing yards in a season opener with a career and game-high 156 yards on 23 carries (6.8 avg.) and scored the first three touchdowns (two rush, one reception) of his career.** His opening-weekend numbers ranked at the top of several offensive categories, including rushing yards (156 – second in NFL), first downs (eight – tied for third in the league), scoring (18 points – tied for first in the league) and total yards from scrimmage (157 – tied for third in the AFC). **The 156 yards he totaled on the ground are the 10th-highest single-game rushing total gained this season.** Griffin scored on 25 and 47-yard touchdown runs against the Chiefs, with the latter run coming in the third quarter with the score tied at 17, and he added a 1-yard touchdown catch for the first scoring reception of his career.

Hearst has provided Denver depth at running back in seven games, recording 20 rushes for 81 yards (4.1 avg.) with one touchdown and two receptions for 20 yards (10.0 avg.). When several Broncos running backs went down with injuries at **Tenn. (12/25)**, the veteran filled in with four rushes for 22 yards (5.5 avg.) before fracturing his left hand, an injury that is expected to keep him out for an extended period. Hearst had his busiest game of the year at **K.C. (12/19)**, recording five rushes for 26 yards (5.2 avg.) and his first touchdown of the year along with a 15-yard reception. 2004 Regular Season:

Johnson has become a reliable pass-catcher and lead blocker at the fullback position, playing in 14 games (3 starts). Statistically, his biggest contributions this season have come as a pass catcher who has tallied nine receptions for 126 yards (14.0 avg.) with two touchdowns. **He also has been a solid contributor on special teams, making nine tackles on kickoff and punt coverage to rank third on the Broncos.** He missed his first game of the season at **Tenn. (12/25)** with a right ankle injury. At **K.C. (12/19)**, the fullback was forced out in the second quarter with a right ankle injury and did not start because Denver opened the game in a two tight-end set. Additionally, he made his first career tackle on special teams against the Buccaneers. He saw one play at fullback and played substantially on special teams vs. **S.D. (9/26)**. At **Jac. Lelie's size and ability to get down the field have given the Broncos' offense a deep threat this season, and he has made several big plays in crucial situations on the way to leading the team in yards-per-catch average (19.9 avg.) and tying for the NFL best in that statistic (along with Pittsburgh's Plaxico Burress) through 15 games (15 starts). **He eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the first time in his career in 2004**, posting 1,014 yards on 51 receptions to rank second on the Broncos. **All six of Lelie's touchdown receptions have been longer than 30 yards (37, 40, 35, 31, 39 and 33 yds.), and he leads the NFL in that statistic. Additionally, his six touchdown receptions of more than 30 yards rank as the second-highest single-season total in franchise history (Anthony Miller had 10 in 1995).** At Tenn. (12/25), he used three catches for 88 yards, a season-best 29.3 avg., to go over the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the first time in his career. The wideout showed great concentration in hauling in a 45-yard pass in the fourth quarter against the Titans as he glanced over both shoulders before turning his body to make the catch. Lelie recorded three catches for 37 yards (12.3 avg.) at K.C. (12/19), including a 21-yarder in the second quarter that converted a third-and-15. He showed great concentration and hand strength at Mia. (12/12) by catching a 32-yard pass over Dolphins cornerback Sam Madison in a two-catch, 60-yard (30.0 avg.) game. Lelie tallied the fourth 100-yard receiving game of his career and his first this year at S.D. (12/5) with a game-high 105 receiving yards on four catches (26.3 avg.). He continued to show his ability to haul in the deep ball against the Chargers, catching passes of 44 and 36 yards in the first quarter. In snowy, frigid conditions vs. Oak. (11/28), Lelie led Denver in receptions with four catches for 80 yards (20.0 avg.). The majority of his yards against the Raiders came on a 57-yard, fourth-quarter catch in which he pulled in the ball and stumbled to the ground before gaining an additional 10 yards to the Oakland 3-yard line, setting up a touchdown run on the next play. He came up with his two biggest receptions on back-to-back plays in the first quarter at N.O. (11/21) by catching a 33-yard pass from Jake Plummer before hauling in a 37-yard touchdown. He finished the Broncos' game against the Saints with three receptions for 79 yards (26.3 avg.) and a touchdown. Lelie hauled in his fifth touchdown catch of the season longer than 30 yards vs. Hou. (11/7) with a 40-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter, and he finished the game with a team-high four catches and 81 yards receiving (20.3 avg.). One of his biggest plays vs. Houston was not a catch but rather a 36-yard pass interference call he drew on Texans cornerback Aaron Glenn in the first quarter that helped Denver set up its first touchdown of the game. He recorded his second consecutive six-catch game vs. Atl. (10/31) as he collected a season-high 94 receiving yards, including a 35-yard touchdown catch. He turned in a big fourth quarter against the Falcons by collecting 54 receiving yards on a single drive (13, 6 and 35-yard catches) that ended with his touchdown reception. On *Monday Night Football* at Cin. (10/25), Lelie had a team-high six catches for 82 yards. He hauled in a 35-yard pass in the third quarter that put the Broncos inside Cincinnati's 20-yard line to set up a field goal, which trimmed the Bengals' lead to 3. He came down with a 31-yard touchdown in the second quarter at Oak. (10/17) on his way to making two catches for 45 yards (22.5 avg.) against the Raiders. On third down in the fourth quarter vs. Car. (10/10) with the Broncos trailing by four, Lelie made a 39-yard, over-the-shoulder, touchdown catch in the corner of the end zone that proved to be the game winner, **marking the third consecutive week that he was involved in the game-changing play.** He added another catch against the Panthers to total 52 yards on two catches (26.0 avg.). Although he only caught one pass for three yards at T.B. (10/3), his effort in going after a fourth-quarter pass helped result in a 37-yard pass interference call that put Denver in position to make a field goal that proved to be the game winner. Lelie pulled down a spectacular 33-yard touchdown grab, which proved to be the game-winner, over the head of Chargers cornerback Quentin Jammer on fourth-and-9 in the third quarter vs. S.D. (9/26) as part of a four-catch, 67-yard (16.8 avg.) effort vs. the Chargers. He recorded his first rushing statistics of the season that day, rushing twice on reverses for six yards (3.0 avg.). He caught three passes for 53 yards (17.7 avg.) at Jac. (9/19) in a performance highlighted by a 39-yard catch that moved the Broncos down to Jacksonville's 6-yard line and set up a field goal right before the half. He also made a tough 8-yard catch on a third down with Denver driving at the end of the game. Lelie hauled in a 58-yard strike from Jake Plummer vs. K.C. (9/12) to begin a Denver series in the third quarter on his way to recording 88 yards receiving on four catches (22.0 avg.) against the Chiefs. The 58-yard catch was the second-longest reception on opening weekend in the NFL. **The 58-yard reception stands as Denver's longest play from scrimmage this year.** With the score tied at 24, his 22-yard catch to begin the fourth quarter

set up a field goal that eventually proved to be the game winner. Lelie also had a key block on Quentin Griffin's 25-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.

2004 Regular Season:

In his first NFL season, Luke is becoming more comfortable in his role as one of the Broncos' regular special-teams contributors, and he has totaled 17 punt returns for 119 yards (7.0 avg.) and 14 kickoff returns for 286 yards (20.4 avg.) in nine games played (four special teams only). Additionally, he has shown improvement as a wide receiver with six receptions for 52 yards (8.7 avg.). He recorded a career-long 32-yard kickoff return at Tenn. (12/25) in a four-return, 96-yard (24.0 avg.) night. He also returned a pair of punts for six yards in the Titans' game. Luke had one of the best games of his rookie year at K.C. (12/19), catching five passes for 40 yards (8.0 avg.) to set career highs. In addition to one punt return (0 yds.), he returned kickoffs for the first time in nearly two months against the Chiefs, posting eight returns for 155 yards (19.4 avg.) **that marked the most kick returns by a Bronco in a game since Kevin Kasper's eight returns at Kansas City on Oct. 20, 2002.** He returned a career-high five punts for 23 yards (4.6 avg.) vs. Mia. (12/12) and played sparingly at wide receiver. He also has gained 35 yards on two kick returns (17.5 avg.) and totaled one reception for 12 yards. He played on special teams only at S.D. (12/5). Luke's first NFL catch, a 12-yard reception, came in a crucial situation with a little more than a minute remaining in the fourth quarter vs. Oak. (11/28) as the Broncos were driving for a potential game-winning score. He was inactive at N.O. (11/21) and vs. Hou. (11/7). Luke was inactive for the first time in four weeks vs. Atl. (10/31). Although he had a relatively quiet game returning punts (one return for two yards and two fair catches) on *Monday Night Football* at Cin. (10/25), he replaced Quentin Griffin as the Broncos' kickoff returner after Griffin suffered a knee injury returning the opening kickoff of the second half. Luke finished the game with two kick returns for 35 yards (17.5 avg.). He made an impact in the Broncos' game at Oak. (10/17) by gaining 59 yards on four returns (14.8 avg.). Late in the third quarter against the Raiders, Luke brought back a punt 21 yards and picked up an additional 15 yards on a face mask penalty. He had two returns for 10 yards (5.0 avg.) vs. Car. (10/10). In his first career game at T.B. (10/3), he gained 19 yards on two returns (9.5 avg.) and made three fair catches. Luke was inactive for Denver's first three games.

- Smith became one of 20 players in NFL history to record 700 career receptions (706 catches – 9,696 yds.) in Denver's game at K.C. (12/19), passing Gary Clark (699 catches) for 20th on the NFL's all-time receptions list.
- Smith became the Broncos' franchise leader in receptions (706) and touchdown catches (59) as he passed Shannon Sharpe in both categories with three catches for 29 yards (9.7 avg.) and one touchdown vs. Hou. (11/7).
- Smith's team-high 1,068 receiving yards rank 10th in the AFC while his 73 receptions also lead the Broncos and rank 11th in the AFC.
- The veteran posted his seventh 1,000-yard season in 2004, a franchise best.
- He hauled in a career-long 85-yard touchdown vs. Oak. (11/28) that marked the eighth-longest passing play in team history despite the snowy conditions.

2004 Regular Season:

The production, consistency and veteran leadership Smith has brought to the Broncos have helped the team contend for a playoff berth as well as inspired teammates. He leads the Broncos with 73 receptions and 1,068 receiving yards (14.6 avg.) and has seven touchdowns through 15 games (15 starts). He ranks 10th in the AFC in receiving yards while placing 11th in the AFC in receptions. **Smith, in his 10th NFL season, was selected by his teammates as an offensive co-captain for the Broncos, joining quarterback Jake Plummer in that role.** In addition to being Plummer's go-to receiver, he leads the Broncos and ranks fifth in the AFC (8th in NFL) in punt-return average with a 10.1 avg. on 21 returns for 212 yards. **Smith** caught a touchdown pass in a six-catch, 58-yard (9.7 avg.) effort at Tenn. (12/25). **He became one of 20 players in NFL history to record 700 career receptions at K.C. (12/19)** as he used a six-catch, 75-yard effort (12.5 avg.) with one touchdown to reach the 700-mark in catches, passing Gary Clark for 20th all-time in career receptions in NFL history. He scored his lone touchdown against the Chiefs on a 22-yard grab with a few seconds left in the first quarter and also eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the seventh time in his career. He caught six of the Broncos' first eight receptions vs. Mia. (12/12) on the way to totaling a game-high eight receptions for 97 yards (12.1 avg.). Against the Dolphins, Smith passed Terrance Mathis and moved into 21st on the NFL's all-time receptions list. Smith hauled in the

longest catch of the game, a 45-yarder, at S.D. (12/5) in a four-catch, 76-yard (19.0 avg.) outing against the Chargers. His 45-yard reception in the second-half led to a touchdown a few plays later and sparked Denver's comeback attempt. He also returned four punts for 33 yards (8.3 avg.) in San Diego, including a 21-yard return that gave the Broncos decent field position for their final drive. In snowy, frigid conditions vs. Oak. (11/28), **he beat Raiders free safety Ray Buchanan for a career-long 85-yard touchdown reception that marked the eighth-longest passing play in team history** on the way to finishing the game with two catches for 99 yards (49.5 avg.). At N.O. (11/21), Smith tallied three receptions for 26 yards (8.7 avg.), which all came in the second quarter, while gaining 36 yards on three punt returns (12.0 avg.). **He became the Broncos' all-time leader in receptions and touchdowns vs. Hou. (11/7)** with three catches for 29 yards (9.7 avg.), including a 13-yard touchdown in the second quarter in which Jake Plummer found the receiver wide open in the left corner of the end zone. With a career-high 208 receiving yards vs. Atl. (10/31), **Smith posted the second most receiving yards in a game in franchise history and joined Shannon Sharpe as the only two Broncos to go over the 200-yard mark receiving.** Additionally, his 208 yards receiving mark the highest single-game receiving output in the NFL this season. He caught a game-high nine passes against the Falcons, including an 80-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter that tied him with Shannon Sharpe for most career touchdowns in franchise history (55) as well as set a regular-season career long. Smith's consistency against the Falcons was evident **as he became the first Bronco and the fourth player in the last 10 years to record 100 or more yards receiving in each half** (107 yds. in the first half, 101 yds. in the second half). He turned in another solid outing on *Monday Night Football* at Cin. (10/25) with five catches for 50 yards (10.0 avg.). He caught his second touchdown of the season in the second quarter on a 3-yard pass. **He eclipsed 9,000 career receiving yards against the Bengals, becoming one of 31 players to accomplish that feat.** Additionally, he passed Ozzie Newsome for 23rd on the NFL's all-time receptions list against the Bengals. He extended his franchise-record streak of recording at least one reception to 82 games at Oak. (10/17) with a 24-yard grab, his lone catch, on third down in the first quarter to move the Broncos inside Oakland's 15-yard line and set up a touchdown one play later. He also converted a third down with a 14-yard run in the third quarter. In starting against the Raiders, **Smith moved past Haven Moses for most games played (142) by a receiver in team history.** Smith led or tied for the team high in receptions for the fifth consecutive game vs. Car. (10/10) with four catches for a team-high 60 yards (15.0 avg.). **His hustle was exemplified by running nearly 100 yards in an effort to chase down Panthers defensive end Julius Peppers,** who intercepted a Jake Plummer pass and took it back 97 yards before getting tangled up with Smith at the Broncos' 3-yard line. He had a team-high four catches for 32 yards (8.0 avg.) at T.B. (10/3). Smith's 11-yard reception moved Denver inside the Buccaneers' 25-yard line on their lone touchdown drive. He caught his first touchdown (16 yds.) of the season vs. S.D. (9/26) and led Denver in receiving yards (75 yards on five catches) for the third consecutive game. **With the score against the Chargers, Smith passed Shannon Sharpe for seventh place on the Broncos-all-time scoring list with 338 points.** He had game highs in receptions (6) and receiving yards (83) for a 13.8 average at Jac. (9/19). His 34-yard grab midway through the second quarter put Denver into Jaguars territory and set up its first points of the game on a field goal. He recorded a game-high seven receptions for 76 yards (10.9 avg.) vs. K.C. (9/12) in Denver's season opener while serving as the Broncos' sole punt returner with four returns for 55 yards (13.8 avg.), including a 30-yard return that was the longest in the NFL that week. **His punt-return yardage total in Wk. 1 was the best in the NFL while his seven catches in the opening week rank third in the NFL.** He caught a pass on the Broncos' first four possessions against the Chiefs.

- Watts is on pace for 33 catches, which would mark the fifth-best rookie receiving output in Broncos history.

2004 Regular Season:

Watts has made strides as Denver's third receiver during his rookie season, appearing in 15 games (2 starts) and totaling 31 catches for 385 yards (12.4 avg.) with a touchdown while adding five rushes for 33 yards (6.6 avg.). He ranks second among AFC rookies in receptions while also ranking second in the conference among rookies in receiving yards (6th in NFL). Watts hauled in two catches for 29 yards (14.5 avg.) at Tenn. (12/25). He finished with one catch for 14 yards at K.C. (12/19) with his lone reception moving Denver into Chiefs territory with a little more than a minute remaining in the first half on a scoring (field goal) drive. Watts' only catch vs. Mia. (12/12) was a 16-yard catch that began Denver's second touchdown drive of the game. At S.D. (12/5), he caught two passes for 23 yards (11.5 avg.). Both of his receptions, a 13 and 10-yarder, occurred on the Broncos' final drive during their comeback attempt. Watts recorded the second start of his career vs. Oak. (11/28) with Denver opening the game in a three wide-receiver set, and the rookie made two catches for 27 yards (13.5 avg.). He showed great balance to stay inbounds on a 19-yard catch, which converted a third down, in the Broncos' game against the Raiders. He caught a 12-yard pass, his only reception of the game, from Jake Plummer for a first down at N.O. (11/21) on a second-half touchdown drive. Watts kept his streak of recording at least one catch in every game alive vs. Hou. (11/7) with a 5-yard reception in the fourth quarter. He also took a reverse against the Texans in the third quarter, running four yards around the left side to set up a touchdown pass two plays later. In a breakout game vs. Atl. (10/31), he made a career-high seven receptions for a personal-best 86 yards (12.3 avg.), including a 7-yard catch that marked the first touchdown of his career. He made major contributions in the fourth quarter against the Falcons by recording six grabs for 78 yards in the final period, including three catches for 41 yards on a drive. He showed great concentration in getting both feet inbounds on his first-career touchdown reception during the Broncos' comeback attempt against Atlanta. Watts came up big for the Broncos on Monday Night Football at Cin. (10/25) by tying a then-career high with four catches for 36 yards (9.0 avg.) while also gaining a first down on a 10-yard reverse in the first quarter. He used his speed to turn up field to make a 19-yard reception in the second quarter against the Bengals to set up Denver's lone touchdown. Watts' only catch at Oak. (10/17) came on a crossing route over the middle in the first quarter that he turned into a 28-yard gain. In his first career start vs. Car. (10/10) with the Broncos electing to open the game in a three wide-receiver set, Watts used a combination of his long arms and sharp reflexes to catch a quick Jake Plummer pass for 14 yards while falling down on a key fourth-quarter third-down conversion with less than five minutes remaining. The catch, which was his lone grab against the Panthers, helped the Broncos run out the clock to seal their comeback win. During his two-catch, 20-yard (10.0 avg.) effort at T.B. (10/3), his 13-yard grab on a third-and-16 in the second quarter moved the Broncos just close enough to make a 50-yard field goal. He also recorded his first career rush against the Buccaneers on a fourth-quarter 7-yard run that converted a third down during the Broncos' seven-minute, 23-second drive that sealed their win. He had a career day vs. S.D. (9/26), setting personal bests with four catches and 42 yards receiving. Watts made two catches, including a 17-yard grab to move Denver into scoring range, during a fourth-quarter drive that set up a field goal against the Chargers. - His four-game streak with at least one (1.0) sack this season was the longest by a Bronco since Alfred Williams in 1996.

2004 Regular Season:

Hayward has been Denver's top pass-rushing threat through 15 games (14 starts) and leads the team in sacks (9.5 for -65.5 yds.) while totaling 58 tackles (43 solo), which lead Denver's defensive linemen, one interception (76 yds.), five pass breakups, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. **Hayward has shown remarkable consistency, posting a four-game streak with at least one (1.0) sack to mark the longest such streak by a Bronco since 1996 (DE Alfred Williams).** With three sacks (-23.0 yds.) at Tenn. (12/25), he tied a career high set Dec. 9, 2001, vs. Seattle, and the pass rusher finished the Titans game with four tackles (all solo), a forced fumble on a sack and one pass breakup. At **K.C. (12/19)**, Hayward recorded one tackle and a pass breakup. He added two tackles (both solo) vs. **Mia. (12/12)** but saw his four-game sack streak (the franchise's longest since 1996 - DE Alfred Williams) come to an end. At **S.D. (12/5)**, he sacked Drew Brees for a loss of nine yards in the second quarter to mark his fourth consecutive game with a sack and led the Broncos' defensive linemen with five tackles (4 solo). He continued to create pressure on the quarterback vs. **Oak. (11/28)** with a 5-yard sack of Kerry Collins in the third quarter that was one of three tackles (all solo) against the Raiders. In the fourth quarter at **N.O. (11/21)**, Hayward intercepted the first pass of his career late in the fourth quarter and took it 76 yards to the Saints' 5-yard line. **His 76-yard interception return was the longest non-scoring interception return in team history and was the fourth-longest overall interception return by a Bronco.** He finished the game with three tackles (1 solo) and one sack (-3 yds.) while helping to limit Saints running back Deuce McAllister to only 42 rushing yards. He led all Broncos linemen with six tackles (5 solo) vs. **Hou. (11/7)**, including a 3-yard sack on Texans quarterback David Carr that ended the first half. Hayward totaled three stops (all solo) vs. **Atl. (10/31)** and recovered a T.J. Duckett fumble that was forced by Al Wilson in the second quarter with the Falcons inside the Broncos' 30-yard line. He led all Broncos linemen in tackles on **Monday Night Football** at **Cin. (10/25)** with six tackles (5 solo). Hayward recorded his 100th-career tackle in a five-tackle game (3 solo) at **Oak. (10/17)** as the Broncos held the Raiders to only 31 yards rushing. He contributed three tackles (two solo) in a start vs. **Car. (10/10)** as the Broncos' run defense surrendered only 64 rushing yards. Hayward tied for the team-lead among linemen with three tackles (2 solo) at **T.B. (10/3)**. He sacked Drew Brees

late in the fourth quarter for -7 yards vs. **S.D. (9/26)** and had four tackles (3 solo) for the Broncos, **who held LaDainian Tomlinson to his lowest rushing total (60 yds.) in 15 games.** He made his first start of the season at **Jac. (9/19)** and totaled six tackles (5 solo), tying a team high, with one sack (-4 yds.) at right defensive end in one of his finest performances as a pro. On the Jaguars' first play of the game, Hayward sacked Jaguars quarterback Byron Lettwich, and the pass rusher followed that up with a tackle on Fred Taylor on the next play. **He played a part in limiting Jacksonville to only 67 yards rushing on 22 carries (3.0).** He had four tackles (1 solo) along with half a sack for -11.5 in Denver's game vs. **K.C. (9/12)**. Hayward and defensive tackle Mario Fatafeh combined to sack Kansas City QB Trent Green for -23 yards on a first-quarter drive that eventually would stall.

At **S.D. (12/5)**, he returned four kicks for 62 yards (15.5 avg.) while seeing a few snaps on defense in passing situations. He gained 85 yards on four kick returns (21.3 avg.) vs. **Oak. (11/28)** and protected the ball despite the snowy, frigid conditions on the field. Alexander scooped up the first fumble recovery of his career at **N.O. (11/21)** on a first-quarter kick return by Michael Lewis, who had the ball jarred free by Terry Pierce. He also tallied one special teams tackle against the Falcons. Alexander tackled Bengals kick returner Cliff Russell on the opening kickoff on *Monday Night Football* at **Cin. (10/25)**, stopping Russell after a 17-yard return. With nickel back Willie Middlebrooks out with a hamstring injury at **Oak. (10/17)** and cornerback Lenny Walls having left the game in the fourth quarter with a separated shoulder, Alexander saw some time at defensive back in addition to his special teams duties against the Raiders. He recorded one stop on special teams against the Raiders. In Denver's comeback win vs. **Car. (10/10)**, he played on special teams only. He pulled down kick returner Jamel White at **T.B. (10/3)** at the end of a 44-yard return in the fourth quarter, keeping the Buccaneers outside of Broncos territory. He also tackled another Buccaneer on special teams that day. He made a tackle on special teams vs. **S.D. (9/26)** while also seeing several plays on defense. He did not record any defensive action at **Jac. (9/12)**. **His 27.5 avg. was the second-highest return average in the AFC for Wk. 1, trailing only teammate Reuben Droughns.** Alexander came up big on the defensive side of the ball late in the game with cornerbacks Lenny Walls (shoulder) and Kelly Herndon (cramps) forced out, making a key third-down tackle on Chiefs wide receiver Eddie Kennison.

He has three of the Broncos' 12 interceptions this season along with 12 pass breakups. Including 15 starts this season, he is the only cornerback in the NFL to play in every possible regular-season game his team played since his rookie season in 1999.** Bailey was pivotal in Denver limiting Titans receiver Drew Bennett to only two catches for 26 yards at Tenn. (12/25), and the cornerback recorded a pass breakup and a solo tackle in the Broncos' Christmas win. At K.C. (12/19), Bailey tallied four stops (3 solo) and broke up a pass. He broke up two A.J. Feeley passes vs. Mia. (12/12) and made three tackles (all solo). In a solid performance by the Broncos' defensive backs at S.D. (12/5), Bailey had six tackles (all solo) and helped limit Drew Brees to a season-low 106 passing yards. Bailey extended his consecutive starts streak to 91 vs. Oak. (11/28). He displayed tremendous closing speed in intercepting a fourth-down Aaron Brooks pass in the end zone at N.O. (11/21) in a game in which he led Denver with 13 tackles (11 solo). He initially was ruled as making the catch out of bounds, but the call was changed to an interception after a replay challenge. Bailey made five tackles (all solo) vs. Hou. (11/7) and helped limit up-and-coming Texans receiver Andre Johnson to three catches for only 28 yards (9.3 avg.). In Denver's game vs. Atl. (10/31), Bailey posted six tackles (all solo) in trying to limit the effectiveness of quarterback Michael Vick. He upended Vick with a hard-hitting open-field tackle late in the second quarter, limiting Vick to a 5-yard gain. Bailey was kept busy on Monday Night Football at Cin. (10/25) by the Bengals' Chad Johnson with many of his nine tackles (8 solo) coming from stops on the Pro Bowler. Bailey recorded a key interception off Bengals quarterback Carson Palmer on a third down at the Broncos' 10-yard line in the second quarter, making a great catch for his second interception of the season. Additionally,

he has played at receiver in three games, mostly on third-down situations, catching a pass for 11 yards. At Oak. (10/17), Bailey helped limit the Raiders to 114 passing yards while also making four tackles (4 solo). Three of his five tackles (4 solo) were for a loss vs. Car. (10/10), and he held Panthers star receiver Muhsin Muhammad to one catch for nine yards, his lowest receiving yardage total in 23 games. Bailey tackled Panthers running back Nick Goings for losses of two and four yards on consecutive plays in the second quarter. He made four tackles (3 solo) at T.B. (10/3). - When he passed the 100-point mark (114 total) this season at K.C. (12/19), Elam recorded his 12th consecutive 100-point season, the longest streak in NFL history.
- He ranks third all-time in 100-point seasons.
- Elam stands fourth all-time in Broncos history in regular-season games played (187), and if he plays in Denver's season finale, will take over sole possession of third place all-time.
- Elam scored at least one point in every game of his career (187), which is the second-longest streak in NFL history (behind Morten Anderson).
- He is tied for third in the AFC (T-4th in NFL) in scoring among kickers with 114 points.
- He notched his 300th-career field goal faster than any other kicker in NFL history vs. Car. (10/10) and is one of only 16 kickers in NFL history with 300 field goals (313 total).
- Elam was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after a strong performance at T.B. (10/3), marking the fourth time in his career that he has won that award.
- He has made two game-winning or game tying field goals in the fourth quarter with the most recent being a 50-yarder vs. Mia. (12/12).
- Elam passed Mark Moseley at N.O. (11/21) for 16th place all-time on the NFL's scoring list (1,414 career pts.).
- His 25 field goals rank fourth in the AFC (5th in NFL).
- He has connected on 25-of-30 field-goal attempts (83.3%), including three field goals of more than 50 yards.
- Elam connected on two 49+-yard field goals in a game for the first time in his career at T.B. (10/3).

2004 Regular Season:

Elam has been a model of consistency through 15 games, connecting on 25-of-30 field-goal attempts (83.3%) with a long of 52 yards. He has accounted for 114 of Denver's 348 points this season (75 pts. on field goals, 39 on extra points) and is tied for third in the AFC (T-4th in NFL) in scoring among kickers. His 25 field goals rank fourth in the AFC (5th in NFL). **Elam has scored in every game of his career (187), which is second-longest streak in NFL history (behind Morten Anderson).** Elam took over sole possession of second place on the NFL's all-time consecutive scoring streak (187 games with at least one point) at **Tenn. (12/25)**, drilling 3-of-4 field goals and all four extra points against the Titans. He also passed Matt Bahr for 15th place on the NFL's all-time scoring list in Tennessee. With a 27-yard field goal and two extra points at **K.C. (12/19)**, **he went over the 100-point mark for the 12th consecutive season for the longest such streak in NFL history.** He currently stands third all-time in 100-point seasons. Additionally, he tied Jim Breach for the second-longest scoring streak in NFL history (186 games) against the Chiefs. During Denver's visit to Kansas City, he kicked off for the first time in 2004 on Denver's inside kick attempt late in the game that the Chiefs recovered. Elam drilled a 50-yard field goal vs. **Mia. (12/12)** in the fourth quarter that proved to be the game winner and also made a 20-yard field goal against the Dolphins. **Elam's 50-yarder was his 16th game-winning or tying field goal in the fourth quarter and his second this season.** Although his 43-yard attempt at **S.D. (12/5)** drifted wide left, he made up for the miss with a 31-yard field goal in the fourth quarter that kept Denver's comeback alive. In snowy conditions vs. **Oak. (11/28)**, he made 1-of-2 field goals. He connected on a 32-yard attempt in the second quarter against the Raiders, but a potential game-tying 43-yard field goal with less than a minute remaining in the fourth quarter was blocked, marking the first time since Nov. 5, 2001, that an Elam field-goal attempt had been blocked. Elam had a busy first quarter at **N.O. (11/21)**, connecting on 48 and 34-yard field goals in his only attempts of the game. He drilled a 52-yard kick in the first quarter vs. **Hou. (11/7)**, which marked his second conversion from longer than 50 yards this season. Elam did not attempt a field goal for the first time this season vs. **Atl. (10/31)** but did connect on all four extra-point attempts to extend his scoring streak to 180 games. At **Cin. (10/25)** on *Monday Night Football*, he moved past Fred Cox for 18th place all-time on the NFL's scoring list with a 29-yard field goal and an extra point. His 49-yard field-goal attempt against the Bengals was wide left, marking his first miss in four weeks. He moved into a tie for 18th place (Fred Cox) on the NFL's all-time scoring list with a 33-yard field goal and four extra points at **Oak. (10/17)**. With two field goals (32 and 33 yards) in the first quarter vs. **Car. (10/10)**, **Elam notched his 300th career field goal faster than any other kicker in NFL history and is one of only 16 players in NFL history with 300 field goals.** Elam helped Denver overcome a stingy Buccaneers defense at **T.B. (10/3)** by hitting 3-of-3 field goals that day. His 50-yarder in the second quarter against the Buccaneers was his longest field goal this season, and he added a clutch fourth-quarter 23-yarder to secure the win. Against the Buccaneers, Elam hit two 49+-yard field goals (50 and 49 yds.) in a game for the first time in his career. **His play against the Buccaneers earned the kicker AFC Special Teams Player of the Week, marking the fourth time in his career he has won that award.** Against the Chargers in Denver's game vs. **S.D. (9/26)**, he drilled two field goals, a 22 and 23-yarder, before hitting a 43-yarder in the fourth quarter to extend Denver's lead to two possessions. His sole miss of the season came at **Jac. (9/19)** when his 51-yard attempt into a stiff wind late in the third quarter fell short. He was successful on his two other attempts at Jacksonville, a 44-yard kick that bounced off the left upright before clearing the bar and a 22-yarder, to account for Denver's only points that game. Elam had a strong opening to the 2004 season vs. **K.C. (9/12)** by connecting on 43 and 45-yard field goals and all four extra points. **He scored 10 points in Wk. 1, which tied for the top mark in the NFL.** His 45-yarder with 13:26 remaining in the fourth quarter against the Chiefs broke a 24-24 tie and proved to be the eventual game winner.

PUNTER/KICKER

A strong-legged punter and kickoff specialist, Jason Baker was claimed off waivers by the Broncos on Dec. 9, 2004, from the Indianapolis Colts and looks to make an impact on Denver's special teams. The fourth-year pro was an integral part of the Kansas City Chiefs' 13-3 record in 2003, punting a career-high 80 times for 3,156 yards (39.5 avg.) with 21 punts inside the 20-yard line. The 2003 season also marked the first time in Baker's career that he handled kickoff duties, and he record 92 kickoffs with 57 of those placed inside the 10-yard line. The Wayne, Ind., native also has seen substantial time with the San Francisco 49ers, playing in 27 regular-season games for that franchise from his rookie year of 2001 through most of the 2002 season, and appeared in two games for the Philadelphia Eagles at the end of the 2002 campaign. His NFL career got off to a successful start with the 49ers as Pro Football Weekly named him to its All-Rookie Team after he placed 21 of his 69 punts inside the 20-yard line. In 2004, Baker was on the Indianapolis Colts' roster from 11/11 - 12/8 after Kansas City waived him 10/5. Including four games played this year (two with Kansas City and four with Indianapolis) before joining Denver, he totaled 213 career punts for 8,442 yards (39.6 avg.) and placed 59 of those inside the 20-yard line. A solid kickoff specialist, he begins his Broncos career with 126 total kickoffs for 5,840 yards (62.5 avg.) and eight touchbacks. Baker entered the NFL as a rookie free agent from the University of Iowa, where he earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors as a senior and ranks first in Iowa history and second in Big Ten annals in both career punts (272) and punting yards (11,304).

2003: Baker enjoyed a career season for the Chiefs as their punter and kickoff specialist, recording a career-high 80 punts for 3,156 yards (39.5 avg. / 33.2 net) with 21 punts inside the 20-yard line, seven touchbacks and one block in 16 games. Signed by Kansas City on 5/13, he also assumed kickoff duties for the first time in his career and blasted 57 of his 92 kickoffs inside the 10-yard line with six touchbacks while showing his special-teams effort with seven tackles. In Kansas City's AFC Divisional Playoff game vs. Ind. (1/11/04), he did not attempt a punt but placed two of his six kickoffs inside the 10-yard line. He tallied a season-high 46.0-yard gross average and a career-best 46.0 net average at Den. (12/7) while drilling two touchbacks on kickoffs. At Cin. (11/16), Baker had a busy day in punting seven times for 235 yards (33.6 avg.) in a game in which he tied a career high with three punts inside the 20-yard line. In a six-punt, 222-yard day (37.0 avg.) vs. Buf. (10/26), he had the first punt blocked of his career when cornerback Pierson Prioleau knocked the ball out of the end zone for a safety. During that game against the Bills, he placed three punts inside the 20-yard line for a career high. Baker had seven punts for 287 yards (41.0 avg.) at Oak. (10/20). In a visit to Lambeau Field to face the Packers (10/12), Baker registered a special teams tackle along with 249 yards on six punts (41.5 avg.). He preceded a solid performance vs. Den. (10/5), which saw him place two punts inside the 20-yard line, with an impressive game at Balt. (9/28). Against the Ravens, he punted a career-high nine times for 322 yards (35.8 avg.), including a career-long 68-yarder, and pinned two punts inside the 20-yard line. He demonstrated his leg strength at Hou. (9/21), drilling five of his seven kickoffs inside the 10-yard line while having a solid punting effort with a 42.8-yard average on four punts.

2002: In 13 games (11 with the 49ers and two with the Eagles), Baker punted 55 times for 2,133 yards (38.8 avg. / 31.5 net) with 14 punts inside the 20-yard line and four touchbacks. Baker was with the 49ers for 11 games before he was released 11/27. He then signed with the Eagles on 12/3 and saw time in two games with them before he was released 12/18. He recorded seven punts for 234 yards (33.4 avg.) in Philadelphia's game vs. Wash. (12/15). In his first game with the Eagles, Baker turned in a solid outing at Sea. (12/8) with six punts for 211 yards (35.2 avg.) and placed two of those punts

inside the 20-yard line. Appearing in his final game of the season with the 49ers, Baker drilled six punts for 240 yards (40.0 avg.) vs. Phi. (11/25). A week earlier, he tallied 299 yards on seven punts (42.7 avg.) at S.D. (11/17). He pinned three punts inside the 20-yard line in a seven-punt, 282-yard (40.3 avg.) game vs. Wash. (9/22). In a game vs. Den. (9/15), he booted five punts for 195 yards (39.0 avg.).

2001: Baker had an outstanding rookie season with the 49ers that saw him earn All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Weekly after punting 69 times for 2,813 yards (40.8 avg. / 35.4 net) with 21 punts inside the 20-yard line and only four touchbacks in 16 games. He also kicked off once and notched two tackles on special teams. In the 49ers' NFC Wild Card Game vs. G.B. (1/13/02), he had five punts for 183 yards (36.6 avg.) and placed three inside the 20-yard line. With three punts inside the 20-yard line vs. Phi. (12/22), Baker set a season high and highlighted his six-punt, 246-yard effort (41.0 avg.). In a visit to Indianapolis (11/25), he booted six punts for 255 yards (42.5 avg.) with three punts inside the 20-yard line. He posted a career-high 344 yards on seven punts (49.1 avg.) at Car. (11/18). One of Baker's six punts vs. N.O. (11/11) went for a season-high 64 yards, and he finished the game with 260 yards punting (43.3 avg.). Baker kicked off for the first time in his career vs. Det. (11/4). He posted a season-high punting average of 49.3 yards on four punts at Atl. (10/14). In his NFL debut vs. Atl. (9/9), he punted five times for 154 yards (30.8 avg.) and placed his first punt inside the 20-yard line.

COLLEGE: Baker was one of the nation's top punters during his four years at Iowa, where he set a school record with 272 punts and 11,304 punting yards while ranking second in Big Ten history in those categories. He earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors as a senior in 2000 after punting 74 times for 3,145 yards (42.5 avg.) with 24 punts inside the 20-yard line. His final year at Iowa also was highlighted by 16 punts of 50 yards or more, and he owns four career punts of more than 69 yards. A former baseball player for the Hawkeyes, Baker concluded his college career with four of the 11 longest punts in school history, including a career-long 79-yarder in the 1997 Sun Bowl. During that game, he set Iowa bowl records with eight punts for 391 yards (48.9 avg.) to earn MVP honors. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and entrepreneurship.

PERSONAL: Baker was a second-team all-conference selection as a senior at Wayne High School in Fort Wayne, Ind., concluding a prep career in which he averaged 39.0 yards per punt while handling kicking duties and playing wide receiver as a team captain. During his junior season, he helped his team to a state championship. An all-around athlete, Baker also lettered on Wayne's baseball team. Born May 17, 1978, Jason Michael Baker resides in Kansas City, Mo.

Marco Coleman joined the Broncos (3/11) as an unrestricted free agent from Philadelphia and will add depth to Denver's defensive line. In 184 career games (169 starts), Coleman has 656 tackles (468 solo), 62 sacks for -410 yards, 17 passes defended, 20 forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. An experienced defensive lineman, he was voted to the Pro Bowl in 2000 when he made 12 sacks. Entering his 13th year in the NFL, he has played for Miami (1992-95), San Diego (1996-98), Washington (1999-2001), Jacksonville (2002) and Philadelphia (2003). Originally drafted in first round (12th overall) by Miami in the 1992 NFL Draft, he has missed just eight games in 12 seasons. Coleman has started all 16 games in seven seasons and appeared in 16 games nine of 12 seasons. He played right defensive end in his first eight seasons and left end the last four years. Coleman was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1992 by *Sports Illustrated* and led San Diego's defensive linemen in tackles three consecutive seasons (1996-98). He has also appeared in nine postseason games, with 41 tackles (33 solo), three sacks and two forced fumbles.

2003: Coleman signed with Philadelphia on Sept. 5, replacing Derrick Burgess, who was placed on injured reserve. He played in 13 games, primarily as a backup defensive end, and posted 10 tackles (5 solo), a half sack and one quarterback pressure. Coleman made three tackles at Buffalo (9/28) and picked up the half sack in the season finale at Washington (12/27). He was a reserve in both of the Eagles' playoff games, where he made three tackles (all solo).

2002: Coleman signed with Jacksonville on June 19 and started all 16 games at left defensive end where he ranked 12th on team with 54 tackles (27 solo), adding five sacks, one forced fumble, one tackle for loss and five quarterback pressures. He led the team's defensive ends in tackles and was one of just six players to start every game on defense. Coleman picked up his first sack as a Jaguar on Oct. 6 vs. Philadelphia (of Donovan McNabb) and notched a sack of Chris Redman on Oct. 20 at Baltimore. He posted a season-high 10 tackles on Nov. 17 at Houston and made two sacks on Dec. 1 vs. Pittsburgh (of Kordell Stewart), marking first multi-sack game since 2000. Coleman tallied his fifth sack of the season Dec. 15 at Cincinnati (of Jon Kitna) and forced a fumble on the play.

2001: Coleman started 12 games in his final season with Washington and missed four games due to a right elbow injury. He collected 55 tackles (41 solo), 4.5 sacks and three forced fumbles. In Week 2 at Green Bay, he made six tackles but suffered a dislocated right elbow in the third quarter and left the game. He was inactive for the next four games, marking the first time in his career that he missed more than one game in a season. Coleman returned to the lineup Oct. 28 vs. N.Y. Giants and made three tackles. Against Seattle (11/4), he posted four tackles, one sack and one forced fumble, and two weeks later at Denver, made five tackles, one sack and one forced fumble. On Dec. 16 vs. Philadelphia, Coleman made six tackles, a half-sack and had one pass defended that led to an interception. He made five tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and a pass deflection on Dec. 30 at New Orleans, and added four tackles and a sack in the season finale vs. Arizona (1/6).

2000: Coleman enjoyed his finest season as a pro when he made a career-high 12 sacks and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl. His sack total topped his previous career-high of 6.5 in 1995 and 1999, and he finished the season tied for eighth in NFL in sacks. Coleman made 62 tackles (42 solo), which ranked eighth on team, and added three passes defended and two forced fumbles. He started all 16 games for fourth consecutive season and played left defensive end for first time after eight years as a

right end (switch made after Redskins signed Bruce Smith). Coleman recorded at least a half-sack in each of the first six games and was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week after an 11-tackle, three-sack game vs. Tampa Bay in Week 5. Those three sacks tied his single-game career-high set 10/25/92 vs. Indianapolis, and his 11 tackles were a season-high. He posted 2.5 sacks in a season-opening win over Carolina. Against Philadelphia in Week 6, he sacked quarterback Donovan McNabb and forced a fumble on game's second play. He netted a half-sack in Week 11 at St. Louis, and again sacked McNabb in Week 12, forcing another fumble. Coleman tallied six tackles in Week 13 vs. N.Y. Giants, posted six tackles and a sack in Week 14 at Dallas and four tackles in Week 14 at Pittsburgh.

1999: Coleman signed with Washington as an unrestricted free agent on June 3 and started all 16 games at right end, finishing first on team in QB pressures (44), second in sacks (6.5) and tied for first in forced fumbles (three). He ranked eighth with 65 tackles (42 solo) and nine tackles for loss, while also posting a recovered a fumble and returned it 42 yards for his first career touchdown (Nov. 21 vs. N.Y. Giants). In Week 2 vs. N.Y. Giants, he had four tackles, two pressures and a forced fumble, and followed that up with five tackles and two QB pressures in the Redskins' 27-20 win over N.Y. Jets in Week 3. Coleman posted seven quarterback pressures in Week 4 vs. Carolina, and eight pressures, 1.5 sacks, four tackles and three assists in Week 7 vs. Chicago. In Week 9 vs. Philadelphia, he suffered a strained cervical spine and left game but came back to start the next week vs. N.Y. Giants and made three solo tackles, two assists, one sack, one tackle for loss and a recovered fumble that he returned 42 yards for a touchdown and his first career score. Coleman had four tackles in Washington's NFC Wild Card Playoff vs. Detroit and eight tackles in the NFL Divisional Playoff Game at Tampa Bay.

1998: Coleman led a San Diego defense, which claimed the league's No. 1 defensive ranking, that allowed only 263 yards and 71.3 yards rushing per game. He led the team's defensive linemen in tackles for the third consecutive season with 51, in 16 starts for the Chargers. Coleman added 3.5 sacks and two fumble recoveries. He collected a season-high nine tackles and a sack in Week 14 at Seattle.

1997: Coleman, who started all 16 games, led all Chargers defensive linemen in tackles for a second consecutive season (48). He added two sacks, one interception (the only one of his career) and forced a team-high three fumbles. Coleman recorded a season-high five tackles, a half-sack and his first career interception at New Orleans in Week 2, and posted five tackles in each game against Kansas City (Week 7 and Week 15).

1996: In his first season with San Diego after being signed as an unrestricted free agent, Coleman made 42 tackles, four sacks and one forced fumble in 15 starts. He posted a season-high six tackles and one sack in the Chargers' Week 6 Monday night game vs. Oakland.

1995: In 16 starts on the season for Miami, Coleman ranked seventh on team with 65 tackles and second with 6.5 sacks. He had a season-high nine tackles and added a sack vs. Saints (10/15), and set a postseason career-high with 11 tackles vs. Buffalo in the AFC Wild Card Playoff game (12/30).

1994: Coleman started all 16 games for the Dolphins and finished the year with 66 tackles, six sacks, four forced fumbles and three passes defended, including five or more tackles in eight games. He opened the season with eight tackles and a sack vs. New England. Coleman posted eight tackles, two sacks (tied a team playoff record) and one forced fumble at San Diego in an AFC Divisional Playoff game (1/8).

1993: Coleman, who started 15 games for Miami, made 54 tackles, 5.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and one pass defended. He had a season-high eight tackles and recorded a sack vs. Bills (9/26). After he fractured his hand vs. Washington (10/4), Coleman was inactive the next week vs. Cleveland. He returned to the lineup vs. Indianapolis (10/24) and made two tackles, and he made two tackles and 1.5 sacks vs. New England (11/21).

1992: Coleman was named the NFL Rookie of the Year by *Sports Illustrated* and Defensive Rookie of the Year by *Football News* after finishing the season with Miami with 84 tackles, six sacks and one forced fumble. His six sacks were the third-highest single-season total for a Dolphin rookie. He made 15 starts (16 played), started the season at outside linebacker before moving to right defensive end for the final 12 games. Coleman posted 13 tackles and three sacks vs. Indianapolis as his first position and followed that with a six-tackle, two sack performance vs. N.Y. Jets. He was the first Dolphins rookie to have back-to-back games with two sacks. Against Buffalo (1/16), he tallied 11 tackles, and made five tackles and one sack vs. Buffalo in the AFC Championship Game. He joined the Dolphins as the team's first-round selection (12th overall) in the draft.

COLLEGE: Coleman finished his career at Georgia Tech as the school's all-time leader with 28 sacks despite playing just three years, and earned All-ACC honors his junior year, playing in 11 games while tallying 67 tackles, 10 sacks and one fumble recovery. He helped lead the school to a share of the national championship as a sophomore in 1990 by making 81 tackles and 13 sacks. Coleman was named second-team All-America by the *Sporting News* and was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Week after a 12-tackle, five-sack performance vs. Maryland. As a redshirt freshman, he started all season at outside linebacker posting 63 tackles and five sacks.

PERSONAL: Coleman attended Patterson Co-Operative High School in Dayton, Ohio, where he was an all-area linebacker. As a senior, he made 84 tackles, 31 sacks, three forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries and blocked an extra point. He lettered three times in football and once in track. Coleman performed a cameo role opposite actor Jim Carrey in the movie *Ace Ventura: Pet Detective*. Marco Darrell Coleman is married (Katrina) and has three children, Kabrione, Kennedy and Kenneth. Born Dec. 18, 1969, in Dayton, Ohio, he resides in both Atlanta and Jacksonville.

DEFENSIVE TACKLE

Ellis Johnson, an accomplished defensive tackle who led all NFL interior linemen in sacks last season, joined the Broncos on Sept. 20, 2004, in a trade with Atlanta for an undisclosed draft choice. In 136 career games (89 starts), Johnson has made 532 tackles (273 solo) and recorded 48 sacks (-315 yds.), highlighted by his eight sacks in 2003 that tied a personal best. He has eight multiple-sack games during his nine years in the NFL spent with the Colts (1995-01) and Falcons (2002-03). A durable veteran who has missed only eight games in his career, Johnson should add to an already potent Denver defense by providing an inside pass-rushing threat on the Broncos' defensive line. He spent the previous two seasons with the Falcons, where he was a vital member of their defensive unit. He played in 32 games (5 starts) for Atlanta and totaled 118 tackles (65 solo) with 15 sacks (-107 yds.) from 2002-03

after the team signed him as a free agent Sept. 1, 2002. Johnson spent his first seven seasons in the NFL with the Colts and started every game he played during a five-year span from 1997-2001 (76 games). The Colts' leader in sacks in 1998 with eight (-34 yds.), Johnson's sack total that year also was a personal best and complimented his 75 tackles (48 solo). That season came before a strong 1999 campaign that saw him register 7.5 sacks (-46.5 yds.) and 76 tackles (34 solo). The Colts selected Johnson in the first round (15th overall) of the 1995 NFL draft out of Florida, and he played in all 16 regular-season games as a rookie (2 starts), totaling 4.5 sacks (-26 yds.), while seeing action in three Indianapolis playoff games (1 start) that year. At Florida, Johnson was a three-year starter and totaled 165 tackles (112 solo), 17.5 sacks (-134 yds.), six forced fumbles and one fumble recovery in 44 games (26 starts) during four seasons with the Gators. His 36.5 career tackles for loss rank 10th all-time in Florida history. He was named National Defensive Player of the Year by CNN as a senior in addition to being tabbed a first-team All-Southeastern Conference selection and earning honorable mention All-American honors from *The Sporting News*.

2003: Johnson played in 16 games (3 starts) in his second season with the Falcons, collecting 64 tackles (35 solo) and eight sacks (-49 yds.). His eight sacks led all interior linemen in the NFL and tied his personal best, which he set in 1998 with the Colts. He had a pair of two-sack games with his first of the season coming vs. New Orleans (10/19) when he pulled down Saints quarterback Aaron Brooks twice for nine yards to post five tackles. A little over a month later at Houston (11/30), two of his seven total tackles were sacks (-9 yds.) to mark the eighth multiple-sack game of Johnson's career. During the Falcons' game at Carolina (9/28), he tied for the lead among Atlanta defensive linemen with seven tackles (6 solo). He had a strong game vs. Washington (9/14) with five tackles (4 solo) and a sack.

2002: Johnson was signed by the Falcons as a free agent on Sept. 1 after the Colts waived him Aug. 28. Playing in a new defensive system, he finished the year with 54 tackles (30 solo), seven sacks (-58 yds.) and one forced fumble in 16 games (2 starts). His seven sacks were second most by a Falcons player and were supplemented by 13 quarterback pressures. In Atlanta's upset win at Green Bay (1/4/03) in an NFC Wild Card Game, Johnson tackled Packers running back Ahman Green for a 4-yard loss on fourth down with Green Bay threatening to score in the second quarter. He combined for four tackles (3 solo) during the Falcons' two playoff games. He had one sack (-6 yds.), six tackles and a season-high three quarterback pressures at Minnesota (12/1). At Carolina (11/24), he added two sacks (-17 yds.). Johnson came off the bench vs. Baltimore (11/3) and enjoyed a strong game for the Falcons as he collected six tackles, one sack (-10 yds.) and one quarterback pressure.

2001: Johnson started all 16 games at right defensive tackle for the Colts to mark the third time in his career and the third time in the last four seasons that he has started 16 games. He registered 61 tackles (25 solo), 3.5 sacks (-38.5 yds.), two batted passes and one forced fumble in his final year in Indianapolis. Johnson showed consistency during his seventh NFL season by making at least four tackles in 11 games. He had a strong game vs. Denver (1/6/02) with one sack (-7 yds.) and four tackles against the Broncos. During the Colts' game vs. Atlanta (12/16), he collected six tackles and 1.5 sacks (-17.5 yds.). In a game at New Orleans (11/18), Johnson made his first sack of the season for a 14-yard loss and totaled three tackles. He made two stops vs. New England (10/21). Johnson had several strong performances in September, making five tackles vs. Buffalo (9/23) and four tackles at N.Y. Jets (9/9).

2000: Johnson played in 13 games (13 starts) at right defensive tackle and made 58 tackles (25 solo) with five sacks (-25 yds.), one interception and one forced fumble. He was inactive for three games (vs. Detroit (10/29), at Chicago (11/5) and vs. N.Y. Jets (11/12)) with a knee injury. He started in the Colts' AFC Wild Card Game at Miami (12/30) and recorded six tackles (3 solo) and one sack, his first ever in the playoffs, that went for -4.5 yards. The Colts played vs. Miami (11/26) a month before their playoff showdown with the Dolphins, and Johnson turned in an equally impressive game that day with five tackles and one sack (0 yds.). A week earlier at Green Bay (11/19), he produced four tackles, one sack and the second interception of his career against the Packers. When the Colts visited Seattle (10/15), he came through with three tackles, one sack and a forced fumble. He posted back-to-back five-tackle games at Buffalo (10/1) and at New England (10/8). Johnson was a dominating presence on the defensive line vs. Oakland (9/10) with seven tackles.

1999: Johnson started all 16 games at right defensive tackle, totaling 76 tackles (34 solo) and 7.5 sacks (-46.5 yds.) while recovering one fumble and breaking up three passes. His sack total in 1999 was the second-highest total among Colts defenders. Johnson started in the Colts' AFC Divisional Playoff Game vs. Tennessee (1/16/00), making four tackles (1 solo). While visiting the Giants (1/14), he turned in a

strong showing with seven tackles (3 solo) and two sacks (-11 yds.). Johnson's season-high in tackles came when he had 10 stops vs. Kansas City (11/7). Two weeks earlier, Johnson made six tackles and two sacks (the third multiple-sack game of his career) vs. Cincinnati (10/24). He added five tackles, including one sack, at N.Y. Jets (10/17). The sack against the Jets came on the game's final play to seal the win for the Colts. In a game at San Diego (9/26), Johnson totaled six tackles and half a sack (-3.5 yds.).

1998: Johnson posted the most complete season of his career and was one of seven Colts to start all 16 games. His 75 tackles (48 solo) were fifth most on the team, and his eight sacks (-34 yds.) were a team and career high. Additionally, he registered one forced fumble and three pass breakups for the Colts. Johnson totaled the second multiple-sack game of his career vs. Carolina (12/27) with two sacks (-9 yds.) to go along with nine tackles and his lone forced fumble of the season. He posted back-to-back games with a sack at Seattle (12/20) and vs. Cincinnati (12/13). In a performance vs. San Diego (10/4), he created havoc on the defensive line with seven tackles (5 solo). His season-high in tackles came vs. New Orleans (9/27) with 10 stops and one sack against the Saints.

1997: Johnson continued his development in his third NFL season with 69 tackles (41 solo), 4.5 sacks (-38 yds.), one interception and two fumble recoveries while playing and starting in 15 games. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles while his sack total tied for the second-highest total among Colts. He played games 1-10 and 13-16 at right defensive tackle, and the lineman started at left defensive tackle at Detroit (11/23). The only game he missed in 1997 was the Colts' game vs. Green Bay (11/16) when a knee injury kept him off the field. His three sacks (-25 yds.) at N.Y. Jets (12/7) were a career high, and he also contributed six tackles. Johnson blocked a field goal at San Diego (10/26), which resulted in a 42-yard return for a touchdown by one of his teammates. A week earlier, he chipped in a season-high nine tackles vs. Buffalo (10/20). Johnson's first career interception came at Buffalo (9/21).

1996: Johnson followed up an impressive rookie campaign by appearing in 12 games (6 starts) and totaling 40 tackles (21 solo) with one pass breakup for the Colts. He started games 5-8 at left defensive end and games 14-15 at right defensive tackle when he filled in for injured Colts tackle Tony Siragusa. In the Colts' AFC Wild Card Game at Pittsburgh (12/29), Johnson was used as a reserve and had a huge game with seven tackles (6 solo). His turned in a strong performance at New England (11/24), when he made seven tackles. Johnson's season got off to a frustrating start after two concussions, the first of which was suffered in training camp and preceded another one in a preseason game vs. Green Bay (8/24), forced him inactive for the first four games of the season.

1995: A first-round draft pick (15th overall), Johnson saw action in all 16 regular-season games (2 starts) during his rookie year with the Colts. He totaled 35 tackles (14 solo) and 4.5 sacks (-26 yds.) on the season. His two starts came at left defensive tackle in consecutive weeks: at N.Y. Jets (9/10) and at Buffalo (9/17), which was a game he started in place of Tony Siragusa and recorded half of a sack to mark the first of his career. He played in all three of the Colts' playoff games, starting at Kansas City (1/7/96), and combined for four tackles (3 solo) in the postseason. In Indianapolis' game vs. San Diego (12/17), he tallied five tackles and one sack against the Chargers. He also notched a sack vs. San Francisco (10/15) for -6 yds., vs. Buffalo (11/5) for -6 yds. and at Jacksonville (12/10) for -7 yds.

COLLEGE: One of the most decorated defensive linemen ever to play at Florida, Johnson was named National Defensive Player of the Year by CNN following his senior year in 1994 after recording 62 tackles (14.5 for a loss), 6.5 sacks (-63 yds.) and five forced fumbles. A three-year starter, he totaled 165 career tackles (112 solo) with 36.5 going for a loss, 17.5 sacks (-134 yds.), six forced fumbles and one fumble recovery in 44 games (26 starts) during four years with the Gators. In addition, his final year at Florida saw the Wildwood, Fla., native pick up first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors as well as honorable mention All-American accolades from *The Sporting News*. Johnson, whose 36.5 career tackles for loss rank 10th all-time in Florida history, was named Most Valuable Player of the 1994 SEC Championship game.

PERSONAL: Johnson attended Wildwood High School in Wildwood, Fla., where he played six different positions (defensive tackle, offensive tackle, fullback, nose guard, defensive end and linebacker) as a senior. An avid outdoorsman who enjoys fishing, Johnson was a member of a hunting and fishing club while with the Colts and owns two farms in Indianapolis. He also is a licensed pilot. At the University of Florida, Johnson was a linguistics major and studied the African dialect of Yoruba (a tribe in Nigeria and Benin). Johnson and his wife, Simone, have two children: Nichole (9) and Ellis Jr. (6). Ellis Bernard Johnson was born Oct. 30, 1973, in Wildwood, Fla., and resides in Indianapolis.

DEFENSIVE END

Anton Palepoi (PAL-a-poy) is an agile defensive end who will provide depth and speed at that position for the Broncos while looking to contribute on special teams. Entering his third season, the former second-round draft choice should continue his development with Denver, which signed him Sept. 22, 2004. Palepoi was drafted by the Seahawks in 2002 and was with the team for two full seasons as well as this year's preseason before being released Sept. 14. In 20 career games (1 start), Palepoi has totaled 20 tackles (11 solo), one sack (-7.0 yds.), two passes defended and one forced fumble to go along with five tackles on special teams. Additionally, he has returned two kickoffs for 22 yards (11.0 avg.) He was selected in the second round (60th overall) of the 2002 NFL Draft from UNLV.

2003: Palepoi played as a reserve defensive end while seeing action on special teams, appearing in seven games (0 starts) and recording three tackles (1 solo) defensively. On kickoff and punt coverage, he made two tackles. He also returned one kickoff for 14 yards at Arizona (9/14). Palepoi played at defensive end as well as on special teams in the Seahawks' NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/4/04), making one stop on special teams. In the Seahawks' game at Minnesota (12/7), Palepoi had a season-best two tackles (1 solo).

2002: Palepoi showed promise in his rookie season, appearing in 13 games (1 start) and totaling 17 tackles (10 solo), one sack (-7.0 yds.), two passes defended and one forced fumble. He also played on the Seahawks' special teams unit, where he recorded three tackles and returned a kickoff eight yards vs. Denver (11/17). He made his first career start vs. Philadelphia (12/8) in place of Lamar King but suffered an ankle injury in the second quarter that kept him out for the remainder of the game. As a result of the injury, Palepoi was inactive for Seattle's remaining three games. At San Francisco (12/1), Palepoi had his second-consecutive three-tackle game to tie a career high. One week earlier, he made three defensive stops vs. Kansas City (11/24). He posted his first career sack vs. Minnesota (9/29) when he pulled down Vikings quarterback Daunte Culpepper for a loss of seven yards. Palepoi's first-ever forced fumble also occurred against the Vikings that day.

COLLEGE: Palepoi played two seasons at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, playing in 17 games for the Rebels and earning a reputation as one of the most intense pass rushers in college football. He totaled 56 tackles (38 solo), 12.5 sacks (-72 yds.) and three forced fumbles. Despite appearing in only 17 games, he registered 18 tackles for a combined loss of 87 yards. Following his junior season in 2000, the defensive end was named first-team All-Mountain West Conference. Before he enrolled at UNLV, Palepoi played at Dixie Junior College (St. George, Utah) and was named the Western States Football League's Most Valuable Player in 1999 after leading Dixie to the JUCO national championship game. His 16.5 sacks and one fumble recovery that season earned him first-team All-American honors.

PERSONAL: Palepoi earned first-team all-state honors as a strong safety at Hunter High School in Salt Lake City. He was active in the community for the Seahawks, spending part of his Christmas Eve in 2003 serving dinner at the Union Gospel Mission in downtown Seattle. The son of Tony and Tutaga Palepoi, Anton Palepoi was born Jan. 19, 1978, in American Samoa.

Demetrin Veal, a versatile defensive lineman who has played both the tackle and end positions, was signed by the Broncos on Dec. 18, 2004, from the Baltimore Ravens' practice squad. The second-year player spent most of the 2004 season on Baltimore's developmental unit after the team signed him Sept. 21, and Veal did not see any time on the Ravens' active roster. Selected by the Atlanta Falcons in the seventh round (238th overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft, the University of Tennessee product played in three games with the Falcons as a rookie and was with the team during the 2004 preseason before he was cut Sept. 5. In three career games (no starts), Veal posted four tackles (3 solo) with three stops coming in Atlanta's game at Indianapolis on Dec. 14, 2003. He was a starter at defensive tackle and end in two seasons at Tennessee after joining the team in 2001 from Cerritos Junior College (Norwalk, Calif.). He finished his Volunteers career with 57 tackles (40 solo), seven sacks (-57 yds.), 13 tackles for a loss and a fumble recovery in 24 games played (12 starts). At Cerritos, the Paramount, Calif., native picked up first-team All-American honors from *J.C. Grid-Wire* and was named Mission Conference North Defensive Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2000 after recording 87 tackles (36 solo). He played only

2002. After being signed to Carolina's active roster from Washington's practice squad Nov. 6, Stuber was inactive for all six games on the Panther's 53-man unit vs. N.O. (11/10), at T.B. (11/17), vs. Atl. (11/24), at Clev. (12/1), vs. Cin. (12/8) and at Pitt. (12/15). Carolina signed him to its practice squad Dec. 23 after his release from the team's active roster Dec. 20. Before joining the Panthers, Stuber had been on Washington's practice squad since Oct. 2. He began the 2002 season with the Packers' practice squad but was waived Sept. 11.

2001: Stuber signed with San Diego as an undrafted free agent April 27 and practiced with the team for the first few weeks of training camp before his release Aug. 8. He joined on with Arizona on Aug. 10 for the rest of the 2001 training camp and was released Aug. 28. The guard also enjoyed a stint in NFL Europe in the spring of 2002, starting 10 games at right guard for the Barcelona Dragons. His efforts played a role in Barcelona recording an NFL-Europe best 4.9 yards per rushing attempt.

COLLEGE: Stuber was a four-year letterman at Colorado State (1996-'00), starting the final 36 games of his collegiate career in Ft. Collins while primarily seeing action as a tackle. As a senior, he was the Rams' starting right tackle for all 12 games and earned first-team All-Mountain West Conference honors as the team secured a conference championship with a 10-2 record. Stuber was tabbed an honorable mention all-conference selection as a junior while also starting 12 games at right tackle. As a red-shirt freshman in 1997, he played in 10 games as a reserve tackle and helped CSU secure the Western Athletic Conference championship with an 11-2 record. A Health and Exercise Science major at Colorado State, Stuber redshirted in 1996 as a true freshman.

PERSONAL: Stuber was a three-year letterman at Northglenn High School in Northglenn, Colo., earning all-conference honors as a junior and senior. He also picked up a varsity letter in track during his senior season. Timothy Paul Stuber was born Feb. 2, 1978, in Denver, Colo., and he and his wife Amy reside in Westminster, Colo.
