BRONCOS TRAVEL TO DALLAS IN WEEK 9

The Denver Broncos (4-4) travel to face the NFC East-leading Dallas Cowboys (6-1) on Sunday at 12 p.m. CST in the Broncos' only road game in November. Denver has won six consecutive games in the all-time series, including three on the road, dating back to the 1998 season.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR VS. COWBOYS

TEAM (8-4 record all-time versus Dallas; 3-2 on road)

*- Needs one win to improve to 9-4 (.692) overall and 4-2 (.667) at home in the all-time series against Dallas.

QB TEDDY BRIDGEWATER (5 games with 70%+ comp. pct.)

*- Needs one game with at least a 70% completion percentage to join Peyton Manning (10-2012; 7-2010) as the only quarterbacks in Broncos history with six such games in a season.

TE NOAH FANT (3 touchdown receptions)

*- Needs one touchdown reception to set a new single-season career high (4).

RB MELVIN GORDON III (receiving TD in each of past 2 games)

*- Needs one receiving touchdown to record three consecutive games with a receiving touchdown for the first time in his career.

DE SHELBY HARRIS (2.5 sacks)

*- Needs a half-sack to produce 3+ sacks for the third time in his career and first since 2019 (6.0 sacks).

WR JERRY JEUDY (967 career receiving yards)

*- Needs 33 receiving yards to reach 1,000 for his career.

S JUSTIN SIMMONS (19 career INTs)

*- Needs one interception to become the 13th player in Broncos history with 20 career interceptions.

WR DIONTAE SPENCER (915 career kick return yards)

*- Needs 85 kick return yards to reach 1,000 for his career.

S CADEN STERNS & CB PAT SURTAIN II (1 INT each)

*- Needs one interception to become the first Bronco with multiple interceptions in his rookie season since Justin Simmons (2) in 2016.

PAT BOWLEN'S BRONCOS SUPERLATIVES

* - Pat Bowlen was the first owner in professional football history to achieve 300 overall wins in his first 30 years.

* - In Pat Bowlen's 35 years as owner of the Broncos, the team had as many Super Bowl appearances (7) as losing seasons (7), including three World Championships.

* - During Pat Bowlen's ownership, the Broncos had the third-highest winning percentage (.598) in the NFL and the fourth-highest in all of professional sports.

* - Pat Bowlen is the only owner in NFL history who has had four different head coaches lead his teams to Super Bowl appearances.

* - The Broncos' 21 winning seasons and 18 playoff berths since 1984 are the most under a single owner in the NFL during that span. The Broncos had an NFL-low seven losing seasons under Mr. Bowlen.

* - Pat Bowlen helped Denver become the only NFL franchise to win at least 90 games in each of the last three decades

* - Under Pat Bowlen, the Broncos were the only AFC team to appear in three Super Bowls in the 1980s. They were also the only team from the conference to win a Super Bowl in the 1990s, capturing back-to-back World Championships in 1997-98 while setting an NFL record for most overall wins (33-6, .846) in a two-year period.

* - During Pat Bowlen's 35 years of ownership, the Broncos sold out every regular-season and postseason contest (NFL-high 300 sellouts) as part of the club's 49-year, 403-game sellout streak that is the longest in NFL history in one city.

* - Denver's 349 national television appearances under Pat Bowlen were the most in the league during his ownership. That total includes a league-high 164 prime-time games as well as 145 network doubleheader appearances.

* - Pat Bowlen helped put the Rocky Mountain Region on the professional sports map with the sustained success of the Broncos. In addition to the team's local popularity, a 2014 Harris Poll identified the Broncos as "America's Team."

PAT BOWLEN'S NFL SUPERLATIVES

* - In 1993, Mr. Bowlen gave an ultimatum to the TV networks that procured a bidding war, bringing FOX (NFC) and NBC (AFC) on as league broadcast partners and nearly doubling the television revenue from those streams.



* - Also in 1993, Mr. Bowlen fought to establish the introduction of the "franchise tag" in the Collective Bargaining Agreement, helping teams secure the rights to their key players.

* - In his role as Chair of the NFL Broadcast Committee, Mr Bowlen led the negotiations of the NFL's \$18 billion TV contract in 1998, the most lucrative single-sport contract in history.



* - Through his work on the NFL Broadcasting Committee and the NFL Network Committee, Pat Bowlen played an important role in the formation of NFL Network in 2003 and worked to increase its distribution among cable providers and its overall growth.

* - According to former NBC Sports Chairman Dick Ebersol, Pat Bowlen was "the single major force in the creation of *Sunday Night Football* in 2006 while leading the NFL Broadcasting Committee.

* - In his position as co-chair of the NFL Management Council Executive Committee, Mr. Bowlen played a key role in the six-year extension of the Collective Bargaining Agreement in 2006 and again was part of the new CBA discussions for the 10-year extension in 2011 that ensured labor peace for the next decade.

* - With an eye toward growing the game internationally, Pat Bowlen has had the Broncos play eight international games in six different countries (7 American Bowls, 1 regular season in London), marking the third-most such games in league history.

* - Pat Bowlen opened INVESCO Field at Mile High in 2001, beginning a three-year period in which eight new stadiums opened around the NFL.





GEORGE PATON ENTERS FIRST YEAR AS BRONCOS GM



George Paton enters his first season as general manager of the Denver Broncos after being hired on Jan. 13, 2021.

Over 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings, Paton (pronounced: Peyton) rose from director of player personnel to vice president of player personnel/assistant general manager. He helped the Vikings to six playoff appearances—with six different starting quarterbacks—while winning four division titles and advancing to a pair of NFC Championship games.

STEVE ATWATER, JOHN LYNCH & PEYTON MANNING ENTER PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

A trio of former Broncos—S Steve Atwater (Class of 2020), S John Lynch (Class of 2021) and QB Peyton Manning (Class of 2021)—were enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame over the weekend of Aug. 7-8, 2021. Atwater, Lynch and Manning give the Broncos five PFHOF inductees in the last three years.

Atwater played the first 10 seasons of his 11-year career with the Broncos after being selected by the club in the first round (20th overall) of the 1989 NFL Draft from the University of Arkansas.

A first-team selection for the 1990s NFL All-Decade Team, Atwater's eight career Pro Bowl selections are the second most by a player in Broncos history. In 167 career regular-season games (166 starts), Atwater totaled 1,357 tackles (857 solo), 24 interceptions (408 yds.), five sacks (34 yds.), 13 forced fumbles and nine fumble recoveries.



Lynch, a nine-time Pro Bowler and a four-time *Associated Press* All-Pro selection, played 15 NFL seasons, including his first 11 years (1993-2003) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and his final four years (2004-07) with the Broncos.

Lynch was inducted into the Buccaneers Ring of Honor and Broncos Ring of Fame in 2016, earning the rare distinction of being inducted into the Ring of Honor/Fame with two NFL teams.

Manning, the only five-time Most Valuable Player in NFL history (2003-04, '08-09, '13), played 18 seasons with Indianapolis (1998-2011) and Denver (2012-15).

Manning is one of two quarterbacks in league history to win a Super Bowl with two franchises (Indianapolis – SB XLI; Denver – SB 50) while also helping the Colts and Broncos to Super Bowls XLIV and XLVIII, respectively. He helped the Broncos to the most wins (55) and highest winning percentage (.764) of any team in the NFL while capturing four AFC West Division titles, two AFC Championships and a Super Bowl victory during his four years with the team.

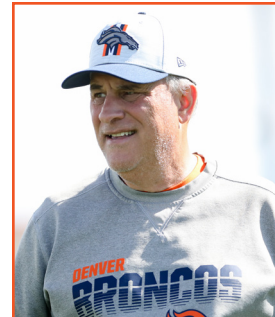

BRONCOS LEAD NFL IN FOURTH DOWN CONVERSIONS

In Denver's Week 1 game at the N.Y. Giants and its Week 5 game at Pittsburgh, the Broncos converted three fourth-down conversion attempts, which tied for the third-most in a single game in franchise history and marked just the eighth and ninth times the Broncos have converted 3+ fourth-down attempts.

In its first two games in 2021, Denver converted five fourth downs after recording four over the entire 2020 season. The Broncos posted multiple fourth down conversions in back-to-back games for the first time since Weeks 15-17 in 2002.

Broncos QB Teddy Bridgewater completed 26-of-34 passes (76.5%) for 328 yards with two touchdowns (125.6 rtg.) in Denver's 23-13 win at Jacksonville. Combined with his Week 1 performance at the N.Y. Giants, Bridgewater became the fourth player in NFL history to open a season with two touchdown passes, no interceptions and a 75.0% completion percentage (min. 12 attempts) in each of his first two games of a season. Bridgewater joins Drew Brees (2018), Aaron Rodgers (2015) and Jeff George (1994) with this distinction.

BRIDGEWATER ONE OF LEAGUE'S MOST EFFICIENT PASSERS

The Broncos acquired quarterback Teddy Bridgewater from Carolina on April 28, 2021 in exchange for a sixth-round selection (No. 191) in the 2021 NFL Draft.

Bridgewater completed at least 75% of his passes in his first three games of the season, joining Peyton Manning (2013) as the only quarterbacks in Broncos history to accomplish the feat in three consecutive games. He also became the first Broncos quarterback to record three consecutive games with a 100.0+ passer rating since Manning in Weeks 6-8 of the 2014 season.

BRIDGEWATER WINS FIRST START AS A BRONCO

In his first regular season game with the Broncos, quarterback Teddy Bridgewater completed 26-of-38 passes (77.8%) for 264 yards with two touchdowns (115.7 rtg.).

Bridgewater's 77.8% completion percentage ranked first among all AFC players in Week 1 and represented the highest mark in team history among the 53 quarterbacks to make their debut for the club. His 95.7 QBR led all NFL players in Week 1 and represents the highest mark of his career.

After allowing 83 yards of offense (73 passing, 10 rushing) and a touchdown on Jacksonville's first drive, Denver's defense limited the Jaguars to just 106 yards of offense and did not allow any points the rest of the game. Jacksonville's final eight offensive drives resulted in four punts, two interceptions and two missed field goals.

Jaguars QB Trevor Lawrence, the first overall selection in the 2021 NFL Draft, finished the game 9-of-25 (36%) for 45 yards and two interceptions after the opening drive.

BRONCOS 'D' BEST IN THE RED ZONE LAST THREE SEASONS

In Head Coach Vic Fangio's first two seasons (2019-20), the Broncos became the first team since red zone statistics began being tracked in 1995 to lead the league in red zone defense in consecutive seasons. Under Fangio the last three seasons, Denver has allowed a touchdown on only 55 of 123 opponent trips (44.7%) into the red zone.

After leading the league in red zone defense in 2019-20 (47-of-107 / 43.9%), the Broncos rank seventh in the NFL defensively in the red zone in 2021 (8-of-16 / 50.0%). Denver has allowed the fewest red zone trips in the NFL this season.

He recorded 42 tackles (26 solo), 7.5 sacks (50 yds.), 19 quarterback hits, nine tackles for loss and one forced fumble in 14 games played this season. Chubb, who was selected by his teammates for the Ed Block Courage Award,

was the only NFL player selected who participated in four or fewer games in 2019.

Before missing the final two games of the 2020 season with an ankle injury, Chubb ranked fourth in the NFL in total quarterback knockdowns and hurries (64) as he was one of two AFC edge rushers (T.J. Watt – Pit., 81.5) represented on that list.
